### MAJOR MARTIN NOT YET LOCATED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, May 6.—Lieutenant Clayton Bissel, advance officer for the army around the world flight expedition, advised the war department today in a dispatch from Dutch Harbor, Alaska, that nothing more could be done on the Pacific side of the peninsula to locate Major Frederick L. Martin, commanding officer of the squadron missing since April 28.

"Everything possible has been started on the north side of the peninsula," Lieutenant Bissel said, adding that the cutter Albatross would be sent into the Bering Sea to search that side of the peninsula if nothing developed at Chignik where the ship is now leading the search for the missing officer.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) BREMERTON, Wash., May 6.—At noon today nothing had been received by the radio station of the Puget Sound navy yard here to indicate whether three army fliers circling the earth had left Alaska, Alaska. But as the latest dispatch indicated weather improvement in the Aleutian Islands, and orders had gone forward to the aviators to leave today for Attu Island if feasible, it was believed here that they had taken the air.

### GOODIN APPOINTED HEAD BLIND SCHOOL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) SALEM, May 6.—The state board of control today appointed Richard H. Goodin, for many years secretary of the board of control, as superintendent of the employment school for the blind at Portland. W. A. Deibel of Klamath Falls was named secretary of the board of control to succeed Goodin. Deibel was cashier of the First National Bank at Klamath Falls from 1905 to 1912, and served as postmaster there under President Wilson and one year under President Harding. Goodin has been acting superintendent of the blind school in Portland for some little time.

### EL PASO BANK IS FORCED TO THE WALL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) EL PASO, May 6.—The El Paso city bank, one of the southwest's largest institutions, failed to open its doors today. The bank, it is understood, was in a weakened condition due to frozen paper. The bank was saved from closing three months ago when \$1,000,000 in gold was transferred to the institution from the vaults of the federal reserve bank. Although a crowd gathered in front of the bank early today there was no disorder.

### RADIO IS HEARD IN OREGON CAVES

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MEDFORD, May 6.—W. J. Virgin, local radio dealer announced today that at a demonstration conducted at the Oregon Caves last Sunday for professor W. H. Brown, and the senior class of the Yreka, California, high school, California, Canada was plainly heard at a depth of 1,600 feet below the surface and 3,300 feet from the cave entrance. Mr. Virgin claims this is a record for underground radio work on the Pacific Coast. Calgary is approximately 1,000 miles from the caves.

### DOOR MANUFACTURERS DEFENDANTS IN SUIT

PORTLAND, May 6.—Formation of a trust to control door manufacturing of the country and destroy competition is charged in a suit filed late Monday in federal court by United States district attorney John S. Coke against seven concerns in Oregon and Washington.

The defendants are: The Wheeler-Osgood Company, Tacoma; Henry McCleary Timber Company, McCleary, Wash.; Buffalo Manufacturing Company, Tacoma; Robinson Manufacturing company; Everett; American Door and Mfg. company, Hoquiam, and Peter Manufacturing company, Tacoma.

The government asks a permanent injunction against these companies and their employees from any of the acts charged in the complaint which are held to constitute conspiracy and combination in restraint of trade. The combination is alleged to have existed since 1916, when the companies caused the door and factory products committee of the West Coast Lumbermen Association to adopt an official west coast door list as "the single list" establishing a uniform price on all doors of a given size, variants as to kind, style and grade determined by a group of fixed discount differentials.

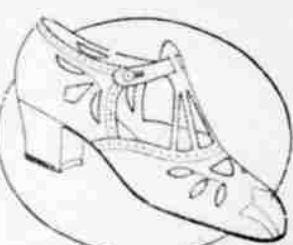
