ACTMENT INVOLVES IN LIQUOR DEALS

NEW YORK, May 8.—A federal jury before Judge Goddard today handed up an indictment charging individuals and a corporation with conspiracy to violate the prohibition act and defraud the government out of liquor taxes in transactions in the west and middle states to have aggregated more than \$500,000.

HUTCHINSON JURY COMPLETED TODAY

KELSO, Wash., May 8.—Selection of the jury in the trial of Elden Hutchinson charged with the murder of his wife, Olive, was completed yesterday and the taking of testimony was started.

The state's first witness to take the stand was Mrs. Inez Freeman, next door neighbor to the Hutchinson family. Mrs. Grace Sherod, who with Mrs. Freeman, discovered the body of the dead woman was also called to testify.

Coroner Vannote testified to finding the body.

During the testimony of the state's witnesses, Hutchinson appeared nervous and slumped down in his seat as the gruesome details of the crime were brought out.

The prosecution is continuing its presentation of evidence today.

OIL CONCESSIONS WILL BE UPSET

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MOSCOW, May 8.—Russian news agency reports from Teheran declare that the movement against the present dynasty regime in Persia is serving as the cloak for a scheme to upset the Sinclair oil concessions in northern Persia, control of which is desired by the Royal Dutch and a French company said to be sponsored by the Standard Oil.

The dispatches says the question of taking the oath to the present Persian parliament is being urged in order to intensify the anti-dynasty sentiment with a view to blocking parliamentary ratification of the Sinclair concessions. The premier however, is energetically demanding approval of the American concessions and striving to bring an agreement among all factions.

DISTRICT FOREST WARDENS TO MEET

SALEM, May 8.—A conference of all district wardens and inspectors of the state forestry department will be held in Salem May 19 and 20, state forester Elliot announced today. The attendance is expected to reach about 50. A meeting of the state board of forestry has been called for the afternoon of the first day.

Among those who will appear on the program are Governor Pierce, George T. Gerlinger, George Peavy, George L. McPherson and Dan D. Smythe, all of the state board of forestry; Joy C. Joy of the Washington forest fire association and Shirley Buck, T. T. Munger, W. B. Osborne and Clay M. Allen, all of the United States forest service.

"The idea of the conference," said Mr. Elliott, "is to get the men together for the purpose of instruction and to discuss the various phases of the work in order that they may get a better understanding

of conditions and just what the state board of forestry is striving for. It is also the purpose to settle any question that may arise as to interpretation of the forestry laws and the forest policy of the state."

On the evening of May 19 a banquet will be held.

ACTIONS OF COAN DESCRIBED TODAY

Man Who Went to Montana to Inquire Into Record of Walsh Investigated.

SOME DRINKING PARTIES

Montana Lawyer Testifies He Knew of "Wild Parties" in Which Justice Dept. Agents Participated.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, May 8.—The actions of Blair Coan, who went to Montana to inquire into the record of Senator Walsh of the oil committee and Senator Wheeler of the Daugherty committee, were further described today in the senate Daugherty investigation.

A. Growd, a Helene attorney, testified he had talked with Coan in Montana in April.

"Coan came to me and said he wanted something to smear Senator Walsh," Growd said. "He asked me for affidavits. He said they had Wheeler where they wanted him and now they would get something on Walsh."

"I told Coan that I knew something about the Campbell case, and that there was nothing they could convict Wheeler or in that case Coan said that was right but that they would have the indictment to hold over Wheeler anyhow. Slattery, the United States district attorney, had not wished to bring the case before a grand jury, even Coan went on, but the department of justice had a charge against Slattery because he had been mixed up in some liquor prosecutions and that made Slattery go through anyway."

Coan, also said, the witness testified, that a Burns agent named McGraw was assisting him.

Blair Coan told the department of justice had 22 men in Montana, Growd said.

Before 1916, Growd said on cross-examination he was a law partner of Senator Wheeler. He became a deputy attorney-general later for the state of Montana.

E. G. Toomey, another Montana lawyer, told the committee he had encountered department of justice agents in the state, who said they were investigating actions of Slattery. The agent, notwithstanding, Toomey testified were out on "drinking parties" with Higgins, who was said to be an assistant to Slattery.

IN THE Torres Straits Islands in the East Indies, there are no trees suitable for canoe building. So the natives, a cruel, treacherous race, import their canoes from the Fly River Delta in New Guinea—another place with an unenviable reputation.
