LETTERS FROM THE PEOPLE

SAYS TAX REDUCTIONS WERE ORDERED ON ORCHARD

Editor News-Review: At the last meeting of the Douglas County Pomona Grange, W. G. Rochester, candidate for assessor was invited to talk on the subject of taxation, especially on conditions pertaining to assessments of Douglas County. After hearing him explain the conditions as he found them, immediately following eight years service of F. L. Calkins as assessor, Mr. Rochester was requested to furnish a list of specific cases in order that the Grange might make an investigation and publish the results of such investigation for the benefit of the taxpayers. The list was furnished and placed in the hands of Dr. C. H. Bailey about April 1st, but instead of taking action he passed it on to Mr. David Busenbark of the Tax Payers League for action at its regular meeting in April, but up to date we fail to notice any mention of the results of their investigation, which we think should appear in the News-Review.

In connection with this matter we as taxpayers, members and ex-members of the Grange would like for the taxpayers of Douglas County to demand an investigation of the Rochester report on assessments of Douglas County and give the result publicly through the press of the county prior to May 12th. We ask the taxpayers, especially members of the Grange to consult the assessor's records and satisfy themselves whether Dr. Bailey was allowed a reduction on his land assessment for the year 1919 amounting to \$640 and another reduction in the year 1923 amounting to \$900, if he was allowed these reductions and other lands of same class was not reduced accordingly, the people should know the reason Dr. C. H. Bailey was so favored. We understand Mr. Calkins reduced assessments on timber land 15 per cent last year and is not assessing orchards this year which throws the whole burden upon the poor small

MEDFORD, May 7.—Yesterday afternoon the greater part of the 720 gallons of wine belonging to August Potard, who with his wife lives on a vineyard west of Jacksonville, was poured out, by order of the justice court. One barrel and 52 bottles of red wines were ordered to be held by the court, in the custody of the county sheriff, but the remainder, including 103 barrels of white wine, was destroyed. The entire supply of liquor in possession of the Frenchman was valued at \$4,000.
