FRENCH POLITICAL TREND IS TOWARD LIBERAL PARTIES

PARIS, May 8.—(A. P.)—The French electoral campaign has been waged in greater political confusion than has existed in the country since, just after the fall of the Second Empire, a royalist parliament was sent to Paris to inaugurate the Third Republic.

Party lines are so broken and party politics so vague that political prophets are at a loss to find a basis for any sort of predictions. The only certain element in the situation is that for several months the pendulum has been swinging toward the left, that is to say in favor of the more liberal parties, radicals and socialists, and against the moderate and conservative government majority.

All the special elections held since last fall including parliamentary, city and departmental, have shown large gains for the socialists and radicals. Local circumstances entered into some of these results but on the whole they are accepted, even by the moderates and conservatives of the "National Block" as showing a decided tendency toward radicalism and socialism.

The radicals and socialists, however, have big gains to make if they wrest the majority of the chamber from the "National Block," which, in 1919 won 15 seats from them and constituted a government coalition of 400 members in the lower house, in spite of the fact that the radicals polled 2,000,000 votes as compared to 1,800,000 in 1914, and the socialists increased their vote of 1,400,000 in 1914 to 1,700,000. The radical and socialist coalition, however, will not go to the country with the full strength of the parties as polled in 1914. The communists have sapped a great deal of the strength of the socialist party. Only the result of the coming election will show just how many votes the communists have taken, but surface indications are that the faction which takes its orders from Moscow will poll in the neighborhood of 2,000,000 votes. This would leave the socialists with about the same number, supposing that the two factions together show a small gain over 1914.

The radical party also has been weakened by the resignation or exclusion of a number of deputies who supported Poincaré's foreign and fiscal policies. These men have formed a new "Radical Federation," which will cooperate with the other groups of the government majority.

The strength of the different groups in the present chamber is as follows: republican democratic entente (national block), 170; Independents, mostly royalists, 27; deputies belonging to no group, 23; republican and socialist action, 47; republican democratic left, 88; republican left, 56; republican socialists, 32; radicals, 82; socialists, 50; communists, 13.

Practically all the parties, excepting the communists, socialists, radicals, republican socialists and a few republicans of the left, were in the government majority and were classed as part of the "National Block."

Special week end rates will be allowed by the railroads for the affair.

Attendance is expected to be big, as the state American Legion convention holds for four days following the 65th meet, and those attending may take in both affairs on the same trip.

Many Roseburg boys are planning to attend the reunion and will leave here by auto on Friday afternoon June 6th.

ROSEBURG STUDENTS WILL GRADUATE

EUGENE, May 8.—(Special.)—Four Roseburg students attending the University of Oregon will be graduated in June, according to a report issued by the registrar.

Of the 210 who will receive degrees, 27 are in the school of education and 23 in the department of English. Both the school of business administration and the department of economics will graduate 18. Thirteen will receive degrees from the school of journalism and 12 from the school of sociology.

Ten have applied for their master's degrees, eight for master of arts and

two for master of science. The Roseburg students to be graduated at the annual commencement, Monday, June 16, are: Wallace Cannon, economics, bachelor of arts; Toka Haynes, English, bachelor of arts; Annabel Denn, music, bachelor of music; Ruth Powell, mathematics, bachelor of arts.

Mrs. Peret, who was 73 years of age, was a pioneer of the Yoncalla vicinity and was dearly loved by many of the residents of that community. She was ill for about three weeks prior to her death. She leaves no relatives other than her son, who is a noted marksman employed by the Peters cartridge company. The funeral will be held at Yoncalla on Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP GOLF CONTESTANTS FACE TRICKY COURSE

DETROIT, May 8.—(A. P.)—The golf course at the Oakland Hills Country Club, where the national open championship will be played June 5 and 6, is regarded by expert golfers as providing about the best test of golfing of any course in the country. Deceiving distances, shifting winds and fairways that are well trapped are some of the handicaps that beset players unfamiliar with the links, and even those who have played over the course before must be on their game, or they will find themselves in trouble.

The total yardage of the course is 6,771 and par is 72.

Always there is a wind. Most often it is from the west, an aid to the player on the first and second holes but dead against him on 7, 8 and 9, while on the other holes it blows across the fairways. The breeze, however, is never constant, shifting frequently enough to make the course a different test entirely, even on the same day.

The difficulty found by most golfers trying out the course for the first time lies in the deceiving distances, resulting in underclubbing shots. Although the fairways are wide and rolling they are trapped well, and shots that are wide are sure to cause the golfer who makes them considerable trouble.

Number 1 hole of 438 yards calls for a down hill drive, with deep traps about midway down on either side of the fairway to catch balls and slices. Number 2 hole is 480 yards, with a wide trap running across the fairway to catch topped drives. No. 3, 129 yards, is the first short hole, with green well trapped, while No. 4 is an elbow hole and measures 410 yards.

The drive from No. 5 tee calls for a carry over a slight hill, and the same condition prevails on the next hole. Number 5 is 425 yards and No. 6 is 354. From No. 7 tee the drive is from one hill to another, with a brook, which also crosses No. 5, ready to catch a hooked second shot. This hole is 383 yards. The green on No. 8 is higher than the tee by about 25 feet, in a gradual rise. The green is a terrace affair with a steep bank in back. The hole is 435 yards.

Number 9 hole is only 250 yards, but any curves either to right or left from the fairway take the ball into traps. The 150 yard No. 10 and the 336 yard No. 11 require careful drives and second shots to avoid hazards. The No. 12 hole of 560 yards is the longest of the 18 and regarded as the most difficult. The drive is from a hill into a valley, with a pond at the right about 200 yards from the tee. A slice is apt to go into the water, while on the left is long grass. Par for the hole is five.

The 130-yard No. 13 is negotiated with a nifty pitch to the green which is surrounded by sand traps. The drive on No. 14 calls for a carry of 175 yards over a marsh. The hole is 475 yards. Number 15 hole is 330 yards, another elbow and No. 16, measuring 350 yards, is one of the most picturesque and difficult of the course. Number 17 is another short hole (133 yards) with a par three, and No. 18, which is 170 yards, is an elbow calling for a good brassie to follow the drive.

SUES COOS BAY TIMES FOR \$10,000

MARSHFIELD, May 7.—E. A. Koen, formerly of Tillamook, Ore., has started a suit for \$10,000 damages against the Coos Bay Times and M. C. Maloney, publisher. Koen alleges that he was about to enter a contract with the Southwestern Oregon Daily News of Marshfield to take the position as editor at \$75 a week.

He states in the complaint that the Times said he had formerly been a propagandist for the Ku Klux Klan element and that because of this the News refused to sign the contract. He therefore asks damages from the Times, alleging that he had nothing to do with the Klan.

RUSSIAN AMBASSADOR RETURNING TO BERLIN

MOSCOW, May 8.—In the absence of a satisfactory explanation or apology from Germany for the recent raid on the Soviet trade mission in Berlin, the Soviet government has directed its ambassador M. Krestinsky, to return to Moscow immediately for a conference.

A Berlin dispatch said last night that Krestinsky and departed for the Russian capital.

Although the Soviet government has not yet decided upon its course of action it is said that reprisals are not improbable.

KLAN WINNER IN INDIANA PRIMARY

INDIANAPOLIS, May 8.—The Ku Klux Klan having put over its favorite, Ed Jackson, secretary of state and the republican nominee for governor, political interest today turned to efforts to define the organization's strength in the state convention and its probable attitude toward regaining party control.

The exact influence of the Klan in the state convention, which meets May 21 and 22 to nominate the state ticket other than governor was not known in the absence of returns from counties showing the delegates elected to the convention at Tuesday's primary but the consensus of opinion was that the Klan had a majority of the 1,350 delegates.

Jackson polled 100,000 plurality over his nearest of five opponents. The republican vote was much heavier than in the democratic contest which ended with Dr. Carleton B. McCulloch gaining a big plurality vote, but without a majority, with the result that the nomination was thrown into the state convention which convenes early next month.
