DISABLED VETS TO HOLD MEETING

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SALEM, May 8.—Approximately 100 disabled veterans of the world war are to meet here Friday and Saturday for their annual state convention. Social activities are planned for Friday, while the business work is scheduled to begin Saturday morning. The program is to be handled by Salem chapter number 3, of which Frank Durbin is commander.

OIL PROBE FAILS TO ATTRACT SPECTATORS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, May 8.—In a committee room destined of spectators the practical details of oil production on Teapot Dome and Elk Hill were described today for the senate oil committee by Foster Bain, director of the bureau of mines in recent weeks, the crowds that once packed the hearing room have dwindled steadily and today for the first time the committee heard its public session with no one present except members, witnesses and newspaper men. It was the first meeting in a week. In order to show that there was oil in Teapot Dome below the second wall creek and, Senator Walsh, the committee prosecutor asked Director Bain about the drilling of a well to the third wall creek sand. The witness said this well was producing about 50 barrels a day.

Seven or eight oil wells have been drilled under the Doherty lease on the Elk Hill reserve, the director said and have produced about 1,500,000 barrels. Most of them, he said were offset wells. The actual average royalty paid by Doherty was 25 per cent in December, the witness

testified, and is now 26 per cent. He said there had been no new drilling under the Doherty lease since investigation began. Director Bain declared the oil in Teapot Dome is not suitable for naval fuel use, and could not be economically prepared for use. The natural and right course, under the circumstances, he said, was to exchange the Teapot Dome oil for other oil which was suitable for the navy.

PREDICT JAPANESE CABINET TO RESIGN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
TOKIO, May 8.—More insistent reports that the cabinet intends to resign owing to prospects of failure in the coming elections are appearing in Japanese newspapers. Influential elements of the privy council are reported to have demanded the resignation on the ground of the government's responsibility in the "diplomatic failure" to prevent adoption of the Japanese exclusion clause of the United States immigration bill.

Vernacular newspapers here quote premier Kiyomasa as admitting the cabinet's responsibility for "failure" regarding the immigration matter.

GASOLINE PRICE 20 CENTS A GALLON

SIOUX FALLS, N. D., May 8.—Virtually all filling stations here today were selling gasoline at 20 cents a gallon, the price established yesterday by an independent company and matched by all the principal companies, including the Standard.

Dealers said no further reductions are expected, "unless there are developments not now foreseen."

MAY LIFT EMBARGO

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
PORTLAND, May 8.—Lifting of the embargo against shipments into Oregon of fruits and vegetables from districts of California free from the foot and mouth disease when shipments bear certification of authorities was recommended to the state livestock sanitary board by four members of the special commission who recently returned from an inspection tour of California.

The commission also recommended maintenance of the closed door to all animal and animal products from all California and establishment of uniform quarantine regulations by all states to prevent the spread of the foot and mouth disease.

FAVOR EXCLUSION

CLEVELAND, May 8.—Amid wild applause, a plenary session of the chamber of commerce of the United States today unanimously adopted a resolution recommending exclusion of Japanese subjects from America by legislative enactment.

SARCASTIC ATTACK ON OREGON SYSTEM

SALEM, May 8.—In a lengthy affidavit in which he humorously and sarcastically attacks the "Oregon system" John U. Smith of Newberg has filed with secretary of State Koser his withdrawal as a candidate for the republican nomination for state senator from Lincoln, Tillamook, Washington, and Yamhill counties. In the concluding paragraph of his affidavit, Smith says:

"Swearing to all the above that is necessary to withdraw, and about the rest of it, the breeder of the less numerous, and of quality, cheerfully withdraws to permit the Holstein breeder and the Jersey breeder to fight out the bewildering political issues of the day, that neither of them dared to say a word about."

ROTARIANS ENJOY TRIP TO GRANTS PASS

Almost the entire membership of the local Rotary club motored to Grants Pass yesterday afternoon to participate in the charter presentation to the Rotary club of that city. Some twenty-six of the boys took passage on one of the local auto stages, while several went by private conveyance. The Grants Pass club had prepared a delicious dinner for their guests. Clubs were represented from Hillsboro, Medford, Portland, Corvallis, Klamath Falls, Coos Bay, Eugene and Roseburg, some 350 persons being present. Governor Miles Higley, in a most impressive manner, presented the charter to Grants Pass Rotary, while gifts from other clubs in the state were also given to the new organization as tokens of appreciation of the birth of the Grants Pass Rotary club. Governor-elect Robert A. JAP PREMIER IN BIG TRAIN CRASH

TOKIO, May 8.—A passenger train carrying former Premier Takahashi, president of the Seiyukai or majority party from Morioka to Tokyo crashed into a freight train today killing three persons and injuring 23. Takahashi was not hurt. The collision coming on the eve of the Japanese elections in which Takahashi is the government's principal opponent, created sensational rumors but there was no evidence to indicate it was anything but an accident.
