BETTER HOMES.

The week May 11-18 has been appointed as Better Homes Week. It is a subject well worthy of agitation by civic agencies. Better homes promote health, contentment, and industry. Young people from a disorderly home and a slack neighborhood feel the depressing influence of their environment. They are less contented with home pleasures, more inclined to enter into street and gang life and to drift away from good influences. The man who has a comfortable and pleasant home gains renewed strength there for his daily labors. He is refreshed by its restful spirit. But if all is in disorder, he becomes discontented with his lot in life, and is in a mood to make trouble. The man who puts up neat homes, well equipped with modern conveniences, to rent to working people at a price within their means, confers a great blessing on the community. He advances its industrial prosperity. It is easier to get skilled labor in a community that has a sufficiency of such dwellings. The industrial development of many cities has been hindered by the lack of homes. Many manufacturing enterprises have been hampered by their inability to get sufficient help at times when business was rushing. And the reason why they could not get help in many cases has been that there was a lack of comfortable houses to live in in those communities. One practical suggestion made by the promoters of this movement, is to build your house so that the living room and dining room constitute one room. When the young people can have their dancing and other parties there, and will not have to go to doubtful places for their amusements. When young life-centers around a home, it is pretty sure to come up with respect for parents and the laws of the community.

THE REPUTATION BUILDERS.

Have you ever been in a store where you felt in your bones that it was necessary to keep one hand on your watch and the other on your pocketbook, and where the goods offered for sale convinced you that if you spent a dollar you would be making a bet with the proprietor, with all the odds in his favor, that he couldn't skin you? Did you ever buy merchandise with the firm conviction that if it proved defective, if you found out when you got home that it was not what it was represented to be, you couldn't get your money back? If you have had these experiences, you have probably been dealing with a non-advertiser. The advertiser is a man who has invested a certain amount in reputation. Generally, he expects that if he sells to you once, he will sell to you again. To make his advertising pay, he must give you a square deal. Sometimes he even spends more to get you into his store the first time than the profit on the first sale amounts to. And yet he gains in the long run, because he knows that if you buy the first time on his solicitation you will buy the second and third times of your own accord. We don't say that every merchant who doesn't advertise is a cheat. We say that the safest way to avoid being cheated is to patronize merchants who have a reputation to sustain. Every regular newspaper advertiser is engaged in building up a reputation for fair dealing. His faith in himself justifies you in having faith in him.

WILL SHIP CARLOAD OF CASCARA BARK

An industry that is gaining considerable headway in this part of the state, is that of gathering Cascara bark for commercial purposes. There is considerable quantity of Chittim trees in this county, as well as on the coast, and in the Coast Range. People living in those districts where the trees are found find it profitable to gather the bark, said Carl Berger today, who is one of the heaviest buyers in Southern Oregon. Mr. Berger stated that he already has a car load of Cascara bark on hand for shipment, and that the commodity is worth approximately \$4000 a car. A second car is in sight, he said, and this lot will come from Oakland, Riddle, the Camas Valley section, and some of it from over the Douglas-Coos county line. In addition to Cascara bark, Mr. Berger also buys Oregon Grape root and pitch from the pine forests. Both of these last commodities are plentiful in Douglas county, and many people find it profitable to gather them for market.

JAPANESE ELECTION CAUSES DISORDER

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
TOKIO, May 10.—Preliminary estimates of the trend of voting in today's general election to choose 464 members of the new house of representatives were unfavorable to the government, even members of the cabinet admitting that likelihood of gaining a majority was remote.

The close of one of the bitterest campaigns in Japanese history was marked by disorders in many cities, resulting in at least one death and injury to several scores and the arrest of more than 800 persons for violation of election laws.

Although extra editions of newspapers this morning carried bulletins announcing the rejection by the lower house of the United States of the proposal to delay authorization of the Japanese immigration interest of the nation centered for the time being at least, on the election, the public for getting immigration issues. These played no part in the campaign, which was strictly along personal and domestic lines.

A statement emanating from the home office this evening claims that the Solyuhonto party, supporting Premier Kiyoura is showing unexpected strength in the early reports. The members of the cabinet, however, do not deny the claims of the opposition combination of a majority.

FRANK TROEH WINS OREGON TRAP SHOOT

PENDLETON, May 10.—Frank M. Troeh, of Portland, member of Olympic trap shooting team was the high gun in the Oregon state championship shoot yesterday with 128 credited out of a possible 200. O. N. Ford also of Portland was second in the competition with 197. W. G. Warren of Huntington Park, was third in the day's shooting with 196. The day was an ideal one for trapshooting and 68 scattergun artists gathered at Collins park for the shooting.

Ray Spangle of Pendleton got the long string of the day by cracking 129 targets without a miss.

In the first hundred of the Oregon state championship, 200, L. E. Simmons of Eugene and W. G. Warren of Huntington Park turned in perfect scores while seven broke 99 birds in that competition. The competition continues today and tomorrow.

POLICE FIRE SHOTS AT FLEEING THIEVES

SEATTLE, May 10.—Police who surprised two men loading a safe onto the rear of an auto at a candy factory here today, gave chase for a mile, firing many shots, lost track of the car returned to the vicinity of the attempted robbery, saw the car standing in front of a house a block from the factory and arrested four men and two women in the house. One man, said to have been the driver of the car, had a bullet wound in a shoulder.

OFFICIALS TO ADJUST VETERAN CLAIMS HERE

Kenneth L. Cooper, Portland sub-district manager of the United States Veterans' Bureau and Roger R. Reynolds, district government insurance representative will arrive in Roseburg this afternoon for the purpose of interviewing local war veterans of this city and vicinity relative to compensation and training grievances, to remain in this city until the morning of May 12.

The men will be in the Legion club rooms at the armory tonight at which time they will be pleased to explain how war risk insurance may be reinstated or term insurance converted into permanent forms of government policies, as well as to take up problem cases directly with the war veteran's compensation or his representative.

"Three billion dollars of government insurance is now held by world war veterans of the country and the amount is rapidly increasing," declared Mr. Reynolds in an advance communication. "It may be paid without fear of contradiction that government life insurance is the best protection available and also the lowest in cost as compared with private insurance with similar benefits. Premium rates are actually less than cost, as the government bears all costs of administration. There are no restrictions as to residence, travel, occupation or military or naval service. There are liberal cash and loan values after the policy has been in force one year."

Mr. Reynolds stated that more than \$2,000,000 dividends was paid converted policy holders last year and that a larger amount has been set aside for this year's dividends. The methods of insurance reinstatement, premium payments and optional settlement plans are very liberal, he stated.

Appointments to meet either or both of the government men during their stay here may be made through Dr. E. R. Stewart, commander of the local Legion post.

U. S. EXPERTS LEAD WAR ON FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE



This is Dr. U. G. SACRAMENTO, CALIF.—The full force of the United States government has been brought into play effectively against the foot and mouth disease in California. The disease has been confined to certain limited districts in the state and the work of stamping it out is proceeding rigorously under the direction of Dr. U. G. Houck, personal Representative of Secretary Wallace, department of agriculture, who has complete control of the combined federal and state forces.

"Every method justified by our past experience and by scientific study is being used to prevent any possibility of spread of the disease and to wipe it out so thoroughly that there will be no chance of its recurrence," said Dr. Houck.

"There is no danger of spread of the disease through shipment of fruits, vegetables or dairy products from the great non-infected areas of California. We know of no instance where the disease has been carried by such shipments," Dr. Houck said.

Complete confidence in the men in the field was expressed by Dr. R. Mohler, chief of the bureau of animal industry, United States department of agriculture, in a message he has just sent to Dr. Houck and the local federal inspectors.

"We have in California," he said, "the best equipped force of inspectors that was ever assembled on a foot and mouth detail."

"Our methods are not experimental, but have been weighed in the balance of practical experience and have always produced the desired results."
