The last special election the vote of the city approved a bond issue of \$15,000 for the purchase of a fire engine and equipment.

NEW RADIO EXPERIMENT ATTRACTS ATTENTION

URBANA, Ill., May 10.—Radio transmission without carrier waves has been demonstrated by station WRM University of Illinois and further experiments may revolutionize broadcasting and receiving according to scientists connected with the institution. Tests have brought responses from all over the country that signals came in loud and clear.

Sending efficiency is increased; tuning is made more selective at the receiving station because of the sharper decrement; tuning out the station at the receiving end is easier, as a result of the method, it is claimed. Much greater business may be conveyed than at present, the scientists assert.

ELKS TO OPEN NEW PARK SITE

Bridge to Farquar's Island Is Completed and Improvements Are Started.

BRIDGE IS TEMPORARY

Permanent Structure Will Be Put in When It Is Possible to Buy Material—Play Apparatus Ordered.

Work started today in clearing up the land on Farquar's island which has been recently purchased by the Elks lodge for the purpose of opening up a children's playground and recreational park. Seventeen acres of timbered land are included in this tract and is an ideal place for a park.

The contractor yesterday completed construction of a temporary bridge across the Umpqua at the foot of Douglas street. The structure has been put in for use immediately and although not the original bridge planned will serve the purpose this summer. It is a six foot bridge and although not built for heavy traffic is substantial and safe. The permanent bridge could not be constructed at this time on account of the fact that the market for steel and other supplies did not justify the purpose.

A little more grade work at the approach is all that is necessary before the new bridge can be opened up and people given the opportunity of visiting the island.

The Elks have set aside a fund of approximately four thousand dollars for the improvement of the land. The first step to be taken will be the removal of the underbrush and clearing up the land. The clear land will be disked and rolled and put in a good condition generally.

As soon as this work is completed tennis courts, baseball diamond, and a football field will be laid out and work will start immediately in conditioning them for use this summer. Two tennis courts for the use of the public are planned and the athletic fields will be primarily for the use of the lodge teams.

Play apparatus has been ordered and is expected to arrive early next week and will be put in as soon as it arrives. All the equipment is strictly modern and is of the type which is being used in the larger cities for the public playgrounds. The slides, swings, teeter-totters, and every other kind of amusement facility for the boys and girls are included in the order. The whole island will be opened to the city and boys and girls will be invited to make it their place to play during the summer months.

Park benches will be installed and other arrangements made to accommodate picnic parties and families on all day excursions. Dr. Stewart, chairman of the board of trustees of the lodge, points out that no more beautiful spot could be found in the country for complete relaxation. With a fine grove of shade trees and plenty of grass and running water on every side, the island affords a truly incomparable site for the park and the Elks are sparing no effort in increasing the natural beauty of the place by adding improvements for the comfort of visitors.

The old well on the island has been condemned and the water declared not fit for drinking purposes. The lodge has let a contract for piping city water to the island to furnish a sanitary water supply.

All the improvement work is being rushed to the utmost capacity in order that the children may have advantage of the park during the early months and the play may become popular for the warm season. It is planned to open it up next week and extend an invitation to every person in the city to visit the place.

In the meantime the market is being closely watched in an effort to get a reasonable contract for the steel required for the construction of the towers which form a part of the permanent structure. The lodge has taken the whole project in hand exclusively and hopes to give the people of Roseburg something of which they may be justly proud.

"Anyway, he was there yesterday morning," Mr. Rogers added. He declined to talk further, to allow his daughter to do so or to make clear the identity of a Mr. Larkin who was traveling with them.

Mr. Rogers firmly declined to confirm or deny a report that the

Austrian government had refused to sanction the count's marriage to his daughter.

When pressed as to her trip homeward he finally declared: "My daughter is coming home with me on a visit."

FARM RELIEF BILL TO BE CONSIDERED

Assurance Given That McNary-Haugen Bill Will Be Acted Upon During Present Session

WASHINGTON, May 10.—Definite decision to have the house consider the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill at this session of congress was reached today by republican leaders.

Assurance was given supporters of the measure that it would be taken up by the house the last of next week or the first of the week following.

Senator Norbeck, republican, S. D., who has charge of the farm relief fight in the senate, said he would be satisfied with the action of the rules committee if it were supported by similar verbal assurance from some majority leader. The farm bloc was not content with the agreement reached this week by a republican conference that some relief measure would be considered. It was indicated, but wanted the promise made a part of the printed record.

Later, Senator Norbeck informed the senate he had decided to withhold his proposed motion to force a vote on the McNary-Haugen bill as a rider to the revenue bill.

Announcement of the decision to give the bill the right of way was made after Chairman Snell of the rules committee had discussed the legislative program with President Coolidge at the White House.

On his return to the capitol Mr. Snell went into conference with Speaker Gillett, Representative Longworth, the republican leader, members of the republican steering committee and several members of the house agricultural committee, among them Chairman Haugen.

After this conference it was announced that the McNary-Haugen bill would be brought to a vote with adequate time allotted for debate.

It was insisted that there had been no indication as to the president's views on the proposals, but republican leaders in the house heretofore have declared that before right of way was given to the McNary-Haugen bill, some assurance should be obtained from the White House that the measure would not be vetoed.

Present plans of supporters of the bill which calls for creation of a corporation with capital of \$200,000,000 to sell surplus farm products abroad are for the house to consider the measure before it is taken up in the senate. Members of the senate farm bloc have been insisting, however, that the proposal be brought to a vote there without delay.
