FARM NEWS

BRING LAMBS THRIVE ON FORAGE CROPS

To avoid stomach worms and promote rapid growth in spring lambs a minimum of labor and feed cost, the use of forage crops is recommended by experts of the United States Department of Agriculture. This plan the ewes and lambs are to graze on wheat or rye sown in preceding fall. Fresh grazing could be provided every two weeks. It may be done by subdividing temporary pastures.

While this crop is being grazed, a crop of soy beans or rape may be sown on other land for feed after the winter crop is gone. The land at bare the winter crop may then be replanted to any other crop that is desirable. On request, the Bureau of Animal Industry, United States Department of Agriculture, Washington D. C., will supply further information on this and other uses of sheep raising.

MUSIC BUILDING TO BE COMPLETED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 9.—The music auditorium of the University of Oregon, the outer walls of which have been standing for three years awaiting sufficient funds for the completion of the interior of the building, will be finished at once, according to action recently taken by the board of regents authorizing the work. When this building is finally completed, the dreams of the school of music for an auditorium where music students can present concerts and entertainments will be finally realized.

The building occupied by the school of music was erected three years ago by the University Holding company, a group of Eugene business men organized for the purpose of financing the building. At that time the University was very much in need of a building to take care of the musical activities on the campus which were centralized in a small wooden building on the north west corner of the campus near the Southern Pacific railroad track.

It was impossible for the University to finance a building for the school of music so a group of men in Eugene, realizing the need of the institution, agreed to finance the work. Plans were made whereby the property would go back into the hands of the state at the expiration of a certain period.

An anonymous friend of the University has agreed to give a pipe organ to the school of music for installation in the auditorium when it was completed.

Engineers who have examined this building have pronounced it almost perfect in construction for the purpose of concert and musical entertainment. It is generally regarded as one of the best of its kind on the Pacific coast.

It will seat 650.

The stage will have an extension which can be used when required to accommodate a large number of performers. When not in use, this extension rests underneath the main part of the platform where it is out of the way. The special construction also makes it possible for the organist at the console to direct the work of a choir or orchestra on the stage.

On the south side of the building will be a glass sunporch which will serve as a promenade for the performers and also be used as an emergency exit in case of a fire. This sun porch will overlook a sunken garden which will add to the beauty of the exterior of the building.

It is the plan of Dean John J. Landsbury of the school of music to make this new auditorium the center of all musical and artistic productions on the campus.

PULLING CHESTNUTS OUT OF THE FIRE

Editor News-Review: In yesterday's News-Review there occurred an article written by Mr. Wm. J. Hodge, taking exceptions to the lowering of the assessed valuation on my farm and also criticizing the Douglas County Pomona Grange for not taking action on an address delivered by Mr. Rochester before the Grange.

In the first place Mr. Rochester was not invited to speak before the grange. He asked for the privilege and it was granted. He rambled around for half an hour in his speech and I asked him to name specific cases in which property had been under assessed in relation to other property in the same neighborhood. He mentioned several, and later mailed me a list of the same, which I in turn mailed to Mr. David Busenbark. As Mr. Busenbark is master of the Douglas county Pomona Grange and also president of the Douglas County Taxpayers' league, and nothing has appeared in the press relative to these cases of under assessment, it may be taken for granted that the taxpayers' league found nothing upon which to base any justification for delving into the matter.

It is no more than fair at Mr. Calkins for me to explain how it happened that the valuation was lowered on my farm. Several years ago I appeared before the Board of Equalization and asked that the valuation on several acres that lie with a slope and are poor soil, be lowered. The board granted the request, after taking the matter under advisement. The county assessor had no option but to accept the findings of the majority of the board, so is not to blame for this lowering of the valuation.

During the past two years no orchard in Douglas county has paid its way. In fact, most owners of orchards are being grubbed out. With this fact facing the assessor, he could do nothing else but lower the assessed valuation on orchards, which I understand has been done throughout the entire county. Today land that will produce hay or grain will bring in a larger income than an orchard that the owner has spent years in developing.

Every time a bearing tree is pulled up, it is, of course, a distinct loss not only to the owner but to the entire county, but economic conditions have been such that every orchardist with whom I have talked has admitted that he has lost money the past two or more years. In my own case, last year I lost about \$1500 on my crop.

I could have explained this to Messrs. Hodge and Rochester when they were "grubbing" around my place one day this week. I heard they were out in the South Deer Creek valley, but they did not come in and permit me to give my side of the story, but immediately rushed into print.

DUTY OF EVERY CITIZEN TO EXERCISE FRANCHISE

Editor News-Review: I would like to call attention to the importance and duty of every registered voter in the state voting at the primary and all other elections. The right of franchise carries with it a priceless privilege, and imposes a serious and solemn duty which should be performed. It is a sad commentary on our republicanism for government that legislation of great importance frequently is placed on the statute books of this state by a very small percentage of registered voters. This is also true of the selection of our public officials, city, county, and state. In many elections even the most important officials heretofore have been elected with probably not over 25 or 30 per cent of the registered vote.

The citizen who is a qualified elector and neglects to go to the polls and vote on election day should be the last person to complain about the election of incompetent officials and the enactment of objectionable laws. Instead, he invariably is the first to protest, unmindful of the fact that the real responsibility for the very situation of which he complains belongs to himself and hundreds of other equally negligent electors for evading their duty as citizens.

Another class of residents of this state is equally censurable and responsible for this condition. I refer to those residents who, although eligible to citizenship, frequently neglect taking out the necessary papers and qualifying as citizens for a great many years after arriving in this country. Even then, it is too often the case that they are impelled to that action by some reason personal to themselves, rather than the more laudable purpose of participating in the election laws, as well as the defeat of vicious and unworthy measures. Bad as this is, it is not comparable to citizens of this country who neglect their duty to vote, thereby failing to measure up to the full measure of good citizenship. It certainly is a privilege to be a part of the electorate in this state where each voter is in effect a legislator. This in itself emphasizes the duty of every citizen to vote at all elections.

Good government is assured in proportion as the electorate participates therein. A great majority of citizens in every community desire good government, clean, trustworthy officials and legislation for the public good. The best antidote for unfaithful public officials and undesirable laws, now elected or enacted by plurality vote, is a general participation by all electors. In all elections, when the voters, by going to the polls, will express their demand for honest officials and clean laws, then and not until then will the best men in every community consent to become candidates for public office.

As president Coolidge has said, "Duty is not collective; it is personal."
