"If Germany is so unfortunate as to object to possibilities of a just and really humane peace offered her by the experts' reports, there is nothing to do but to leave her to her fate."

FLOODS DO BIG DAMAGE IN VIRGINIA

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) RICHMOND, Va., May 13.—The most serious flood in years engulfed sections of Virginia today rendering numbers of families homeless and causing heavy damage to railroad property, farm lands, highways and public utilities.

One person, a youth, is known to be dead. Rivers and streams in virtually all parts of the state, swollen to record proportions by heavy rains general for the last three days, continued their appearance today with no sign of abatement.

The Shenandoah river late yesterday had reached a depth of 50 feet above normal, the highest in more than half a century. Railroad tracks were reported as covered with water.

Damage of more than \$200,000 was reported at Charlottesville, where the Rivanna river attained a stage of 25 feet above normal. Several bridges were demolished.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) RICHMOND, Va., May 13.—Flood waters from the James River filled the culverts in lower Main street today and government forecasters, predicting a further rise of two or three feet, expected the street to be inundated. Franklin and Carey streets already are under water.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The swollen waters of the Potomac river here today were covered with floating debris from wreckage caused by floods in its upper reaches. Water was unusually high in the vicinity of Washington, flooding many small houses along the river banks and carrying away small pleasure crafts.
