CHILDREN PREPARE FOR HUGE PAGEANT

Daily rehearsals are being held for the historical pageant which is to be presented by the pupils of the grade schools of Roseburg during the strawberry carnival. This event is to be one of the most interesting of the schools of the city have ever attempted and is unique in many respects.

The pageant has been prepared by Miss Hagelstine, music supervisor of the schools, and the script has been carefully edited for historical exactness by Prof. Horner of the Oregon Agricultural college, who is one of the foremost authorities on Oregon history.

The children will depict the country before the coming of the white man, will show the entrance of the first settlers, the progress and development of the resources and products of modern times. The music and dances will be beautiful and the historical facts to be offered will be as nearly reproductions of the original happenings as is possible.

It is believed that this is the first time in Oregon that such a pageant has ever been prepared and staged by grade school children. Several adult pageants have been given, but one of this magnitude has never before been attempted by children of such young ages.

There will be more than 800 grade school children, participating, and in addition the high school glee clubs and the high school orchestra will be used, swelling the number to almost 1,000.

Lights are to be strung in Laurelwood park where the pageant is to be given, and it is probable that some unique lighting effects can be worked out.
