IRON PIPE USED TO KEEP MINERS ALIVE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) GILLMAN, Colo., May 13.—Depending upon an iron pipe one and a half inches in diameter, running through 50 feet of earth in the bowels of the Black Iron Mine of the Empire Zinc company here, for food and air to sustain life, five imprisoned miners today awaited rescue from the little pocket 1500 ft. underground, where they were imprisoned by a cave-in of ore Saturday afternoon. Early today the rescue workers started to drill through 25 feet of rock in hope of being able to reach the five by this afternoon. Despite the fact that air had to be forced through the pipe which serves as a casing for a tunnel drilled through to the men Sunday afternoon, rescue workers found time to slug into the tube from the 1,500 foot level and to pass jokes up to the imprisoned men to help them maintain their spirits.
