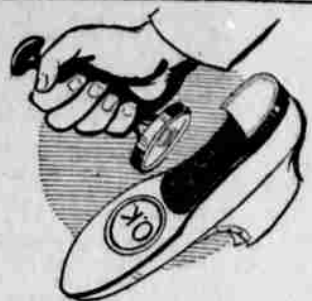

MAJOR MARTIN

DANGER OF DISEASE LURKS IN TRAVEL

If foot and mouth disease breaks out in Oregon it will probably be because some human carried it in, reports Dr. B. T. Simms, veterinarian of the experiment station and representative of the state livestock sanitary board guarding Oregon interests in the stricken California districts.

"More than 90 per cent of the California outbreaks seem to have been spread through human agencies," Dr. Simms writes. "Livestock owners should be very careful not to allow anyone on their premises unless they know that such person has not been in the infected districts."

All laborers and milkers whose whereabouts are not known should have their clothing and shoes dipped in a 1 to 1000 solution of bichloride of mercury before allowed on the premises. Hands, arms, face, feet and legs should be washed in the same solution, care being taken not to allow any to get into the eyes.

"The first week after an outbreak is the most dangerous as to the spread of the disease. Stock owners should not allow any visiting whatsoever if they suspect the disease in any of their animals. Idle curiosity has caused many outbreaks in California."

"When the disease is suspected all livestock should be confined, dogs tied up and family kept at home. No animal products such as milk and cream should be sent off the farm. No visiting of any kind should be allowed until a veterinarian has made a diagnosis."

Wherever the disease is suspected owners should call the county veterinarian immediately. Dr. Simms advises. Where there is no veterinarian in the county the county agent should be called.

INTERNATIONAL AMITY SOUGHT BY MEANS OF YOUTHFUL CONTACTS

(By Associated Press.)

NEW YORK, May 13.—Embarking June 21 on a "friendship trip" through Europe, 20 American boys will constitute the first group of this kind to advance international amity in accordance with a resolution adopted by the League of Nations Assembly. The tour, which will occupy ten weeks, will be under the auspices of the Young Men's Christian Association of North America.

The boys, ranging in age from 16 to 19 years, are selected on the basis of outstanding leadership qualities. The choice, for the most part, has been in the hands of state and local Y. M. C. A. and H. Y. clubs, although other groups, including the grand council of the Order of DeMolay, high school of Potomac, Pa., and the Brick Presbyterian church of New York are sending representatives. The DeMolay council is choosing its delegate, whose name will be announced early in June, from a group of fifty boys from various chapters whose records show special achievement and a promise of unusual leadership. His expenses will be paid by the order. In nearly all other cases the trip will be financed by the boys' families. Special arrangements have materially reduced the usual cost of such a tour.

Seventeen boys have already been selected. They are Henry J. Harding of Brooklyn, N. Y.; Robert L. Harding, also of Brooklyn, who attends Amherst College and will represent Massachusetts; Harding Mott of Flint, Mich., attending the Hotchkiss school in Lakeville, Conn., who will represent Connecticut; Stuart E. Hockenbury, Harrisburg, Pa.; Howard S. Kennedy, 2nd, Troy, N. Y.; James Edward Rice, Jr., Trumansburg, N. Y.; Will S. Mitchell, Jr., Little Rock, Ark.; Robert M. Shafer, New York City, representing the Hill School of Pottstown, Pa.; William Frautschi, Madison, Wis.; Allan B. Wright, Rockville Center, L. I.; John Alden Behnke, Appleton, Wis.; David S. Hunter, Brooklyn, N. Y.; James Lyman Bidwell, Hartford, Conn.; Dallas Webb Dorr, Flint, Mich.; John Jacob Gunther of New York City and the Gunnery School of Washington, Conn., representing the Brick Presbyterian church of New York, and William Gorman McMillan, Baltimore, Md.

The tour has been arranged as a result of plans made at last year's World Conference of Workers Among Boys, at Portschach, Austria. It is a part of an effort to help establish better understanding and more friendly relations among nations, as well as being a new feature in the educational work of the association. J. A. VanDus, boys' work secretary of the International Committee of Young Men's Christian Associations, who was executive secretary of the Portschach Conference, is general director of the trip. He will be assisted by Harry J. Center of Flint, Mich., and Ernest P. Roberts of Brooklyn, N. Y., both experienced in boys' work as well as in foreign travel.

Invitations have been sent to twenty European countries asking that each select, through its national Y. M. C. A. secretaries, a representative boy to accompany the American travelers on a 20-day cruise through the Norwegian fjords, including a trip to North Cape. It is believed that through this contact with various nationalities, by means of daily companionship with boys of their own age, these possible future leaders in their respective countries will gain a broader outlook and develop a more sympathetic understanding of foreign points of view. Assurances have already been given of the hearty cooperation of the countries to be visited.

The itinerary includes, besides the Norwegian cruise, trips to England, France, Belgium, Holland, Sweden and Denmark. Outstanding features will be visits to Oxford, Stratford-on-Avon and the British Empire Exhibition in England, the Olympic Games in France, and the International Boy Scout Jamboree which is to be held in Copenhagen from August 15 to 20.

Future similar tours are planned if this summer's experience is successful. At present it is expected that there will be two optional tours offered for 1925, one taking in northern Europe, and the other the principal countries of southern Europe.

Other plans under consideration call for an educational "friendship trip" of older boys to Japan and the Far East, boys in the United States for European boys, and a possible cruise around the world occupying an entire year.

When Dickey was nine years old his father organized the Winona, Ind., assembly that developed into the big nationally known Chautauqua. Young Dickey grew up with this venture, and his first job with it was making reports on attractions. This developed to such an extent that a big auditorium was necessary. A building seating 4,400 was put up and at the age of 24 years Dickey was assistant general manager.

Just prior to the world war, Dickey was vice-president of the Coast-Alber Chautauqua. Prior to that he was general superintendent of the Klappa organization, which toured a number of prima donnas and singers.

In 1918 Dickey conducted the entire program of the war exposition of the United States and the allied governments for the department of public information. He had charge of 32 cars of war trophies. With this he broke all world's attendance records for short time exhibitions when he presented the exposition to 40,000 paid admissions in Pittsburgh in one afternoon. This exposition was shown under his direction in many cities and was seen by hundreds of thousands of spectators.

Later Dickey came to Cleveland as secretary of the Cleveland Advertising club and from there was made business manager of the Cleveland Symphony Orchestra, leaving this position to become manager of Cleveland's big municipal auditorium. He was appointed by Mayor Fred Kohler, with the understanding that no politics should enter into the administration of the hall.

Since taking over the management of the hall a great variety of attractions have been booked by Dickey, hundreds of thousands of persons paying admission to them. So well did Dickey operate the building that he was able to show a profit of \$25,000 to the city last year, despite the great expense connected with the hall.

Few attractions can be thought of that have not been present at the hall under Dickey's supervision and management. Included in the list are a complete three ring circus with menagerie, boxing matches, basketball carnivals, horse polo tournament, agricultural exhibition, food shows, building shows, grand opera, moving pictures, drills, musical concerts and many other events.

In many instances one event would follow closely on the heels of another and a well functioning organization and a good system was necessary to get the building ready for the incoming attractions. Never was an event delayed. Double attractions have run simultaneously in the basement and main arena.

Padrowski, the Polish pianist played to thousands of music lovers in the main arena, while a poultry show was on exhibition in the basement. Both attractions moved smoothly.

It was in this hall that John Philip Sousa obtained the gate receipts that broke the records of his long history, more than 23,000 people attending his two concerts. John McCormick sang before the biggest audience of his career in this hall and it was here that a world's record attendance at indoor grand opera was recently established, all under Dickey's supervision.

CODDLING MOTH SPRAY

Commercial growers of apples and pears are very much interested at this time in the control of coddling moth. Clean apples or pears cannot be expected unless this insect is not expected unless this insect is taken seriously. Every grower is fairly well grounded in spraying for this insect, but nevertheless the average grower gets ten to thirty-five percent injury from the worm. The trouble lies in dates of application, which vary with each year. The entire subject is gone into a practical way in a recent Farmers' Bulletin No. 1326, Control of Coddling Moth in the Pacific Northwest. Prune and cherry growers will be interested in Farmers' Bulletin No. 1410 on Brown Rot of Prunes and Cherries in the Northwest. These bulletins are now on file in the County Agent's office and may be had on request.

JUDGE YOUR CONGRESSMAN BY HIS VOTE

Dear Mr. Hawley:

I not by your platform that you say you will diligently work for farmers' relief. As your opponent I should like to ask you, as a farmer, if you were working diligently for farmers' relief on August 22nd, 1921, when the Farmers' Relief Export Bill was up for passage, which bill you will have to admit would have then done more than a dozen McNary-Haugen bills can do now for the farmer. The congressional records show you failed to vote for the farmers by not voting at all.

What relief do you figure you were giving the farmers when on November 29th, 1922, you voted for the Ship Subsidy Bill, which would not only have literally given our Merchant Marine to private parties as our Navy Oil fields were given away, but it also provided a bonus for the recipients for the operation of them.

Also what relief did you diligently seek in behalf of the farmers and laborers when on February 21st, 1920, you cast your vote for the Esch-Cummins Bill with its 6 per cent guarantee, including very objectionable labor provisions?

Also on June 15th, 1921, when Representative Scott of Michigan undertook to destroy the LaFollette Seaman's Law on the Great Lakes by repealing the lifesaving requirements and the safety provisions for the proper manning of vessels, why did you again side step your responsibility by failing to vote?

Also on October 22nd, 1921, when the National Income Tax was up for consideration, why did you vote with the profiteers to repeal the excess profit tax and reduce the surtax rates on incomes of millionaires from 65 per cent to 32 per cent, which the Progressives in congress after a hard fight were able to raise to 50 per cent?

You say you are for adjusted compensation for the soldier boys. How is it we have failed to hear of your endorsing the Ladd Bonus Bill which has been before congress several years? The Ladd Bonus Bill would
