### AERIAL BOOZE RUNNERS WILL BE COMBATED

SPOKANE, Wash., May 15.—Aerial liquor running and possible combative methods to curb the practice will be one of the principal topics for discussion at the coming session of the Northwest Sheriff's association this summer. Roy Lyle, director of the federal prohibition forces of this state announced during a recent visit to Spokane.

After visiting the district adjacent to Carlew, Wash., north of here and about 20 miles from the Canadian border, Mr. Lyle expressed the belief that automobiles are carrying liquor carboys across the line from Canada and depositing them in various locations for the airplane smugglers. No mention landing fields in the vicinity, Mr. Lyle said, would give the airplane men access to the carboys. "As we are watching these fields closely at this time," he stated, "as

well as the highways, I believe that runners in eastern Washington will slacken down. Airplane bootlegging is one of our most serious problems at this time and we expect to devote considerable time at the sheriff's meetings to figure out a way of combating it."

Mr. Lyle said that his department has access to an airplane and that he has a flyer in his service, but no money to operate the plane.
