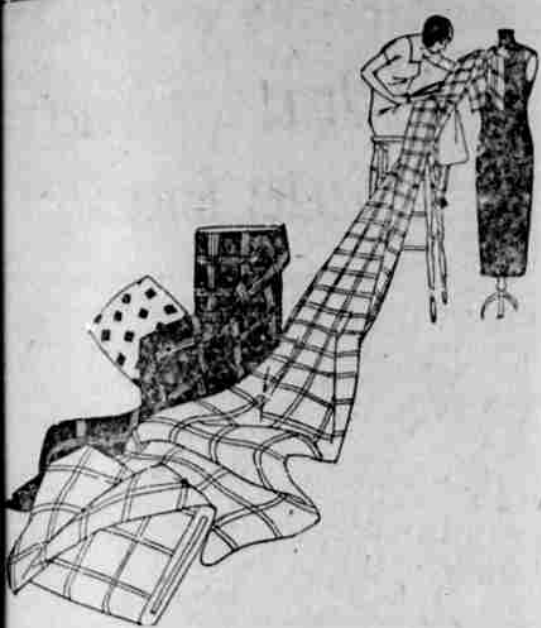

ROAD STRIKE LEGISLATION UP

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, May 16.—A rail-
road threatening transportation
emergency would result auto-
matically in suits by the government
to the roads affected into re-
sulting under an amendment to
the Senate bill approved to-
day by the Senate sub-committee.
The bill itself, which provides for
the creation of a system of ad-
ministrative tribunals on which the
roads and their employees would be
tried, then was reported for-
ward to the sub-committee to the

full Interstate commerce committee.
A similar bill is to come up in the
house early next week.

The amendment provides specifically
that when a strike or lockout re-
sults on a railroad which the pres-
ident considers may bring a trans-
portation crisis he shall at once in-
struct the attorney-general to file
a suit for receivership and shall seek
appointment as receiver of a man
"who has no financial connection
with the railroad."

MRS. J. R. WILSON DIES IN PORTLAND

Mrs. J. R. Wilson, aged 45 years,
and a resident of this city since her
birth, died in Portland last night
where she was awaiting an operation
to remove a goitre. Mrs. Wilson left
here last week for the city to receive
medical treatment, but had not grown
strong enough to undergo an opera-
tion.

For forty-five years Mrs. Wilson
had resided in this community, her
home being on South Main street dur-
ing the greater portion of that time.
She was formerly Mrs. Lewellen un-
til her marriage some seven years
ago to J. R. Wilson. They have made
their home on a farm at Winston,
where they were located at the time
of her death. She has been troubled
with the goitre for some time and it
was considered the immediate cause
of her death. She is survived by her
husband J. R. Wilson, a son, Archie
Lewellen of Chico, California, two
daughters, Mrs. Roy E. Clark, of Cen-
ter, Colorado, and Mrs. George Molt,
of Chico, L. F. Wilson, Mrs. O. D.
Welch, Archie Wilson, Myrtle Wilson
and Mrs. W. H. Carter of this city
were stepsons and daughters of the
deceased.

The body will arrive here today and
funeral services will probably be
held Sunday, although no definite ar-
rangements have yet been made.

ITALIAN OFFICIAL SCORES POLITICIANS

GOLDEN, Colo., May 16.—Public
affairs the world over "would fare
much better if they rested less in
the hands of politicians and more in
those of engineers," Prince Gelasio
Castani, Italian ambassador to the
United States told the graduation
class of the Colorado School of
Mines here today.

The prince delivered the com-
mencement address.
"Engineering," he said, "trains
the mind to search always for the
truth, the correct fundamental facts
underlying every problem. You can
muddle up facts in law, politics and
in diplomacy, but you can not fudge
with facts when you tackle an en-
gineering job; if you do your steel
structure will fall down or your en-
terprise fail."

"Engineering develops respect
for truth, and therefore, develops
an instinctive hatred for deception,
lying to yourself to please others."

NEBRASKA CHURCH BURNED TO GROUND

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

HASTINGS, May 16.—Half an
hour after a stormy congregational
meeting in the First Baptist church
here Thursday night the building
burned to the ground. According to
officials the blaze was of incendiary
origin.

The meeting was called by the
church deacons to allow the congre-
gation to decide on the advisability
of permitting an alleged Ku Klux
Klan lecturer to hold a series of re-
vival meetings in the church.

The building was valued at \$40,-
000 with \$17,000 insurance.

ATTACK IS MADE ON M'NARY MEASURE

WASHINGTON, May 16.—A vi-
gorous attack on the McNary-Haugen
agricultural bill was made today be-
fore the house rules committee, by
Pennsylvania, while a special rule to
bring the measure to the floor of the
house was being requested by other
members. Representative Haugen,
Republican, Iowa, chairman of the
agricultural committee and joint au-
thor of the bill urged action on a
rule-and representative Aswell, who

DOHENY WILL NOT BE FORCED TO TESTIFY

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, May 16.—Ed-
ward L. Doheny Jr., of Los Angeles,
will not be required to testify before
the special oil grand jury in the dis-
trict of Columbia supreme court.
Justice Hitz so ruled today in dis-
missing the petition of the grand
jurors that Doheny be required to
answer questions despite his claim
of his constitutional privilege that his
answer might tend to incriminate
him.

The decision was made after Altee
Pomerene of special government
counsel in the cases had concluded a
brief argument. Justice Hitz did
not ask to hear from Frank J. Ho-
gan, counsel for Doheny.

Mr. Pomerene expressed the be-
lief of government counsel and the
jurors that in declining to testify,
E. Doheny was not acting in good
faith and was seeking to protect his
father, Edward L. Doheny, Sr., who
made a loan of \$100,000, to Albert
B. Fall on November 30, 1921, while
Fall was a member of the cabinet.

Young Doheny was the messenger
in the transaction, his father hav-
ing testified before the senate oil
committee that it was he who deliv-
ered the cash to Fall.
