The socialists who claim the lions share of the credit for defeating the bloc national, are beginning to show uneasiness at the continued absence of such men as Herriot, Painlevé and Briand, who logically, they say, should be at the helm of the new coalition ship but all of whom appear to be waiting for some one else to take command.

Some of the more ardent and impatient socialists and radicals are rather severe on the leaders who remain in seclusion now that the victory is won. They declare that the most active of these leaders, Herriot and Painlevé have made known through friends that they are available candidates for "inactive" jobs as the presidency of the republic and presidency of the chamber of deputies, two of the most lucrative and uncompromising posts in the republic.

54 SUB-COMMITTEES TO SHOW DEMOCRATS NEW YORK AS IT IS

NEW YORK, May 15.—The citizens' non-partisan committee which has shouldered the responsibility for entertaining delegates and visitors to the Democratic National Convention has decided to experiment with the theory that a stranger likes to "learn the ropes" from one of his own kind.

Stanley J. Quinn, directing vice-chairman of the committee, has taken charge of the experiment, and has named 54 sub-committees to help him put it to the test.

"We are not going to attempt much mass entertainment," said Mr. Quinn. "We believe smaller parties, whether gotten up for sight-seeing, theatricals, banquets or just plain conviviality, are much more enjoyed by the visitor and far less fatiguing."

Furthermore, the average visitor to New York doesn't see the most interesting things. He wears himself out looking for the night life, or does a lot of misguided sight-seeing. He doesn't learn a thing about the most interesting phase of New York life, that is how the New Yorker lives, works and amuses himself.

Thus the 54 sub-committees. Each one is made up of natives of a state or territory who have come to New York and made good. And each will work with the various state societies of "native sons" and the regional clubs, such as the "Rocky Mountain Club."

Each sub-committee or group will be host to delegates, alternates and accredited visitors from its state or section. It will provide automobile transportation, see that the strangers get one home-cooked meal a day, make certain they are properly housed; act as their theatre guides; direct them to the best of the white light dance and dine clubs on Broadway; take them on suburban and seaside trips; act as their mentors in visits to the art centers, in fact, as Mr. Quinn said, "make it easy to do the things all visitors would like to do."

"For there's no use in bringing 200,000 people to New York unless we make them glad they came," Mr. Quinn explained. "That was the idea back of our invitation to the Democratic party to hold its convention here; to demonstrate that New York wasn't so big as to be blasé, uninteresting or altogether sufficient unto itself; that it really is a metropolis of home folks."

There will be, of course, a few mass entertainments. Mayor Hyman and his convention committee will be hosts to all the 2,600 delegates and alternates at a banquet the night before the convention formally opens. The Merchants' Association has arranged for an all-day jubilee at one of the beaches when the big business of the convention is finished.

The New York Newspaper Club has plans for a midnight festival at Coney Island at which its 1,000 members will become acquainted with the expected thousand or more of visiting journalists.

There will be at least one formal state or group banquet staged by the 54 sub-committees for each of the delegations.
