HIGHLY ESTEEMED LADY

OF YONCALLA PASSES
Harriet Francis LeCompte was born at Nashville, Ill., April 18, 1851, and passed away at Yoncalla, Oregon, May 6, 1934, from the home, aged 82 years, 19 days. Her life was spent in her birthplace, Nashville, Ill., where on Sept. 13, 1881 she was united in marriage with Augustus S. Peret. Mr. Peret served with the union forces during the Civil War on the northern front, and passed away in Yoncalla, Oregon, 22 years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Peret lived in La Fayette, Indiana, and in St. Louis, Mo., for several years, and in 1899 removed to Yoncalla, Oregon, where the family home has since been maintained. Mrs. Peret was a communicant of the Presbyterian church, and a devoted and faithful member of Golden Link Rebekah Lodge No. 144 at Yoncalla, Oregon. She was a charter member of the lodge; active in its councils for nearly a quarter of a century; and at the time of her death had been its treasurer for seven years. Mrs. Peret was taken ill on her 73rd birthday and lingered for 19 days before she was called to her reward. Mrs. Peret is survived by her son, Gus Peret and his wife Hazel, of Yoncalla, Oregon, and four nieces: Mrs. Hattie Simmons, Mrs. Mamie Heister, Mrs. Bonnie Janisch, Mrs. Helen Haeblerle, of St. Louis, Mo., and one nephew, Paul Carter, of Nashville, Ill., also a great nephew, Robert E. NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE HAYNES STREET

Notice is hereby given, that at a meeting of the common council of the city of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 5th day of May, 1934, the following resolution was adopted:
"Resolved, that the common council of the city of Roseburg deems it expedient and necessary and hereby proposes to improve Haynes street from the east line of Stephens street to the west line of Jackson street, in the city of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:
First: By grading said street to the proper sub-grade.
Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty feet in width with reinforced concrete pavement, and by constructing sidewalks along each side thereof, abutting the curbs;
Third: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary;
Fourth: By constructing street monuments;
Fifth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe, if necessary;
Sixth: By constructing catch-basins, if necessary;
Seventh: By constructing concrete curbs.
Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the city of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans and specifications and estimates of the city engineer, filed in the office of the city recorder on the 5th day of May, 1934, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.
The entire cost of said improvement, including engineering, interest and all other expenses which the city of Roseburg would not have incurred except for the making of said improvement, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited by said improvement, as provided by the charter of the city of Roseburg and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the city of Roseburg.
The estimate of the city engineer of the probable detailed cost of said improvement is the sum of \$5058.70.
Resolved, that the city recorder of the city of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said improvement as provided by
