ISSUE OF "VOLT" DESCRIBES BRIDGE

The Robert A. Booth Bridge, pride of Douglas county is given a splendid write-up in this month's issue of The Volt. Copie's unique publication which has a mailing list of over 18,000. The entire issue is devoted to an article on "The Highway Situation" and presents a comprehensive survey of the present condition of Oregon's highway as well as the constructive program for the year.

The dedication of the Robert A. Booth Bridge occupies a prominent position in this number and is illustrated by two excellent photographs taken by local studios which show the entire length of this beautiful structure. Concerning the dedication, The Volt, makes the following statement:

"On the left the 'Robert A. Booth Bridge' which spans the North Umpqua River at Winchester, is shown. This bridge, one of the handsomest on the Pacific Highway, was dedicated on April 27, 1924. The structure consists of seven 112-foot reinforced concrete arch spans, including the approaches, the bridge measures about 900 feet across. It was built as a co-operative project by the State of Oregon, Douglas county and the Federal government. Among the speakers at the dedication were: Governor Pierce, Mayor George Baker of Portland, State Bridge Engineer C. B. McCulloch, Irving E. Vining, president of the State Chamber of Commerce and R. A. Booth, former chairman of the State Highway Commission, for whom the bridge was named."

In another part of the article, considerable space is devoted to the highway record of Mr. Booth, from this we quote as follows:

"With direct bearing on this matter of highway improvement, some ten thousand citizens of Oregon recently gathered near Roseburg, Oregon. They assembled to celebrate the dedication of a connecting link in the Pacific Highway, which famous route of motor travel is indicated on our map by the solid black line. The link was the new bridge which spans the North Umpqua River at Winchester. Officially named the 'Robert A. Booth Bridge' in honor of one to whom the state of Oregon is indebted for its excellent system of highways. Mr. Booth was appointed a member of the Oregon State Highway Commission on April 1, 1918. He served as a member until November 15, 1920, when he was elected chairman and acted in that capacity until his resignation on May 26, 1923. During his incumbency the State Highway Department invested approximately fifty-five million dollars in highways."

An excellent highway map is an outstanding feature of this issue which promises to prove popular with the tourist as well as with every resident of the territory involved.

Arrangements have been made to secure an extra supply of this highway number in order to take care of the big demand for extra copies that is predicted.

It stands in St. Mary Cray, across Kentish village and became known to the American poet when he visited the poetess Eliza Cook. The appearance of the smithy at present hardly meets the description in the poem.

The "spreading chestnut tree" vanished long ago, being felled because it darkened the neighboring houses and the building now is to go for an equally utilitarian reason; its site is wanted in furtherance of a street widening plan.

WINCHESTER TO GET EVENING MAIL SERVICE

After many weeks of effort the News-Review has at last succeeded in obtaining a special permit to allow the Winchester readers to be included among those of the News-Review family living north of Roseburg who secure their papers each evening. The post office department has at last granted permission for the Winchester mail to be included among the papers going north each evening and from now on the patrons of the paper will be served there also.

Some time ago when the train schedule was changed, the News-Review secured permission to send out papers each afternoon to the communities on the north. The afternoon train south also handles these papers under a special ruling. On the north, however, the town of Winchester was omitted as the train made no stop there and the department refused to accept that bundle. The proposition has been before the postal authorities since the change was made, and a determined effort has been put forth to obtain a ruling permitting the mailing of papers to Winchester. This has at last been secured, and although the Winchester bundle must be kept separate from all others and handled in a different manner, the News-Review will endeavor to supply its Winchester readers with papers each night.

There is perhaps no other paper in the state, which sets its news in the hands of its subscribers in less time than the News-Review. At the same time the people in Roseburg are unfurling their papers, residents as far south as Hiddle are looking over the day's news. In giving this service it has been necessary to secure a number of special privilege orders from the post office department, and the News-Review is indebted to Postmaster Heinline of Roseburg for his assistance and help in these matters.
