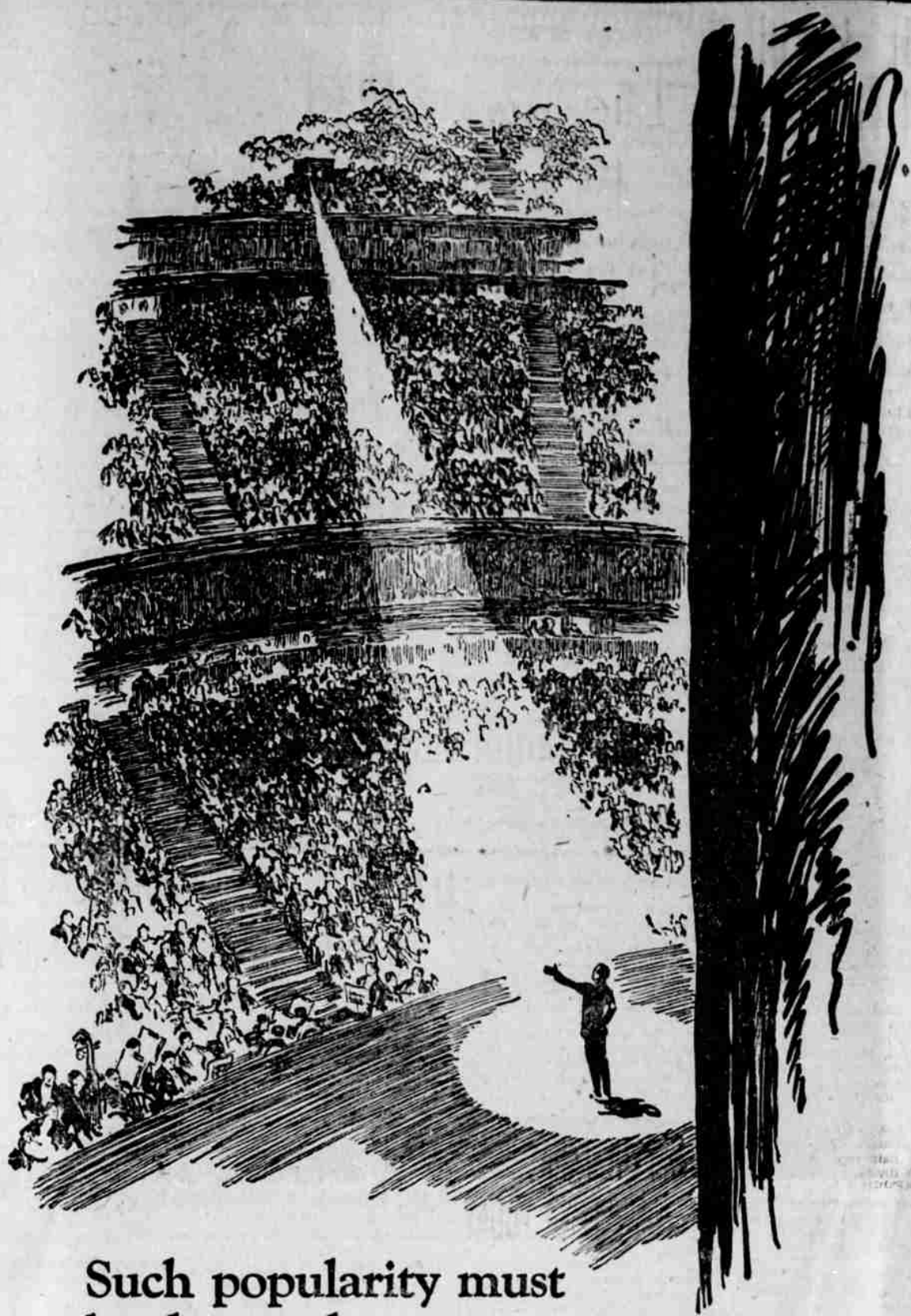

AVIATOR SLIGHT MISHAP

SHANGHAI, May 20.—Captain Pelletier Dolsy, French aviator, arrived today from Canton on his flight.

At 4:20 o'clock this afternoon, 20 minutes after his flight from Paris, he suffered a slight mishap.

While on a golf course, he collided with a golf ball, which he brought down, and the tail end of the plane was smashed. The aviator, traveling at a low rate of speed, escaped injury.

LONDON, May 20.—Captain Pelletier Dolsy, the French aviator who landed at Shanghai today on his flight from Paris to Tokyo, damaging his machine in coming down, informed Reuter's Shanghai correspondent that he did not intend to

continue his flight. The abandonment, the message says, was due to the accident which damaged the engine and propeller as well as the tail of the airplane.

SHANGHAI, May 20.—The wreck of Captain Pelletier Dolsy's airplane which was damaged when he landed here from Canton on his flight from Paris to Japan, has disorganized his plans, pending advice from Paris.

Officials are convinced, however, that the flight will not be abandoned.

The flier might, however, be delayed indefinitely awaiting a new airplane from Paris, or he may possibly accept the use of a machine which General Ho-Feng-Ling, military governor of Shanghai, is reported to have offered him.

The reception to Captain Dolsy at the French club was converted into a scene in which laudation mingled with commiseration. The French consul-general, M. Wilden and the officials openly wept with Dolsy and his mechanic. The disaster is attributed

to a bad choice of a landing place and the inadequate marking of it.

SHANGHAI, May 20.—Captain Pelletier Dolsy, who arrived here yesterday from Canton on his flight from Paris to Japan, has announced the definite abandonment of his attempt owing to the damage which his airplane sustained in landing.

ACTION UNWARRANTED

PORTLAND, May 20.—Proceedings to have the "alleged Oregon Federation of Patriotic Societies," the Ku Klux Klan, and the Southwick Press held guilty of contempt of court for distributing political tickets before the election, were declared unwarranted by Circuit Judge Bingham of Salem, sitting in Portland yesterday.

The action was brought by an organization designating itself the Oregon Federation of Patriotic Societies, which obtained a court order from presiding Judge Tarzwell making it unlawful to distribute the tickets. Judge Bingham declared that a cause of action was not given in the complaint.

HANIHARA MAY RESIGN

TOKIO, May 20.—Ambassador Hanihara may be "permitted to resign" his Washington post shortly, Foreign Minister Matsui told newspapermen today. The foreign minister's statement was made to a gathering of representatives of the Japanese press after today's cabinet meeting and was the result of insistent inquiries. He admitted the subject had been discussed by the cabinet today. The foreign minister stated, however, that there had been no formal interchanges between the foreign office and the ambassador dealing with the matter although Tokio officials have known that Mr. Hanihara was determined not to remain in the United States. The minister emphasized that the ambassador's retirement, should it be actually become a fact, would be purely voluntary.
