SACRAMENTAL WINE TO BE DOLED OUT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, May 20.—Distribution among members of Jewish congregations in Portland is to be stopped, and Rabbis are to decide on the amount that is to be allotted to each congregation for use in actual performance of ceremonies of the Jewish faith, according to announcement today by District Attorney Myers, after a conference with a number of prominent Portland Jewish church members who called on him.

Members of the delegation explained to Myers that they believed the laws permitting distribution and use of wines were being abused and asked that in the future only what the amount is to be decided at a meeting next Monday at the office of Rabbi Jonah R. Wise.

The Volstead act allows two gallons a year for each member of a Jewish congregation, and an additional two gallons yearly to each person in the members family. The state law cuts this allowance somewhat. Some congregations have re-year, it was said, but under the new plan even the largest congregations to 50 gallons.

THAW IS ARRESTED ON ASSAULT CHARGE

NEW YORK, May 20.—Harry K. Thaw, arriving from Philadelphia this afternoon was served with a bench warrant charging him with second degree assault upon Frederick Gump, Jr., of Kansas City in 1916.

PASSAGE OF BONUS AFFECTS MARKETS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, May 20.—Passage of the soldier bonus bill over the president's veto brought a flood of selling orders into the stock market, opening prices of industrial and railroad favorites showing losses of 1 to 2 1/2 points.

American Sugar refining, Crucible and Gulf States Steel, Davison Chemical, New York Central, American Woolen and Willys-Overland preferred sagged 1 to 2 1/2 points on initial sales. Baldwin broke 5 points to 105, a new low; United States Steel dropped 2 to 44, and General Electric 3 1/2.

RUM RUNNER SHOOT DOWN COP

EUGENE, May 20.—Shot down on a Eugene street by a bootlegger while making an arrest, Earl Humphrey, city traffic officer, is in a Eugene hospital recovering from a wound in the face and neck that will, doctors hope and expect, leave no permanent injury. Other officers are searching the valley over for Leslie Farmer of Eugene, 28, who is said to have done the shooting.

Humphrey, in company with C. A. Cornell, traffic officer, of Cottage Grove and Creswell, had arrested Farmer on a tip that he was handling booze. The arrest took place in front of the Oregon litney office and Seventh avenue west, between Williamette and Olive, about 10 o'clock Sunday night.

They looked the car over for liquor, but found none, and, suspecting it was hidden in the luggage compartment in the rear, asked him to open it. Farmer said he had no key, and that he would have to go around the corner on Olive street to Pierce's garage to get it. Humphrey sat on the seat beside him, while Cornell mounted the running board, and Farmer started driving west. Instead of turning at Olive he put on good speed and headed due west on Seventh avenue.

Both officers were unarmed. Humphrey by reason of the fact that he carries his gun in the side-pocket of his automobile and Cornell because he was off duty, so they had no way to stop the car except to handle the control levers. Cornell leaned forward and pulled out the choker, halting the machine in front of L. Blyen's house on Seventh between Charnelton and Lincoln.

Immediately Farmer started shooting, according to the authorities. His first shot was directed at Humphrey who was hit in the mouth and knocked backward. Cornell and dropped from the running board and started back two blocks to his hotel to get his gun. Farmer, witness says, took another shot at Humphrey, but missed him, then ran

away from his machine, turning again to shoot at the officers. He lit out on foot on Lincoln, a half block away, and headed north.

That his recapture should be affected easily because of the fact that Farmer has one leg, the left, missing at the knee, and wears a peg leg in its place, is the belief of officers.

Cornell joined with Chief Deputy Van Svarverud and all city officers in a hunt that took until 2 o'clock Monday morning. C. D. Farmer, street commissioner and father of the young man who did the shooting, assisted them to the utmost, according to Chief Deputy Svarverud. The father believes that a kick his son received from a horse several years ago has made him unbalanced, and attributes the almost tragic occurrence to this accident.

Humphrey, once he revived, got out of Farmer's car, which is now in possession of the authorities, and walked back to the Oregon litney office, got in his car and drove to the Eugene hospital, where he went in for treatment. He was operated on at 1 o'clock this morning. The bullet, one from a .35 calibre automatic pistol, cut a small hole in his hip, knocked out two teeth and imbedded itself in the muscles of the neck, from which position it was removed. Had the gun been larger and more powerful the shot might easily have proven fatal. The roof of Humphrey's mouth is also torn by the missile.

When officers later searched Farmer's car, they found a quantity of liquor in the luggage carrying compartment, they say.

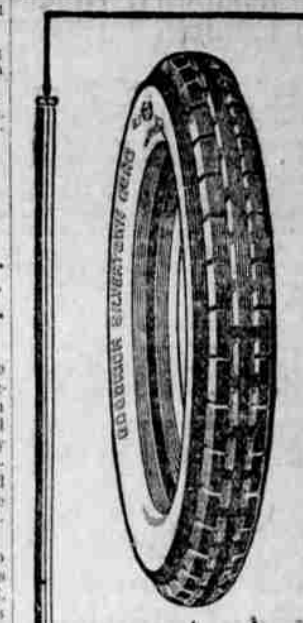
FRISCO BATTER LEADS
