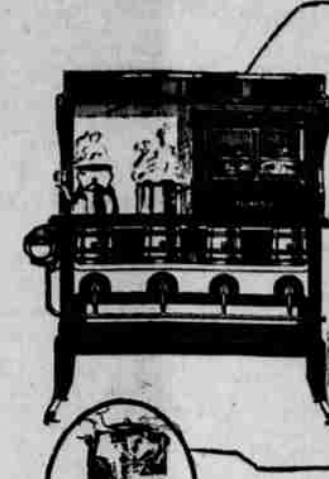

NIAGARA, Neb., May 21.—The grave supposed to contain the body of Arthur Frazier, Indian war veteran was opened here today and after examining the body, physicians and officials of the veterans bureau said they were no nearer than before to knowledge of whether the body actually is that of Frazier or whether Frazier is alive and at home, as his parents and friends claim. American Legion officials believe another body was sent home from France and buried as Frazier, but have been unable to substantiate their claim. The youth said to be the real Arthur Frazier is at the home of his parent at Fort Lookout, on the lower Brule Indian reservation, suffering from shell shock.

YOUTH CONFESSES HE MURDERED SIX MEN

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW ORLEANS, May 21.—Eugene Vidrine, 25 years old of Ville Platte, today confessed to killing six men, according to a report received here by the New Orleans States from the Sheriff's office of Evangeline parish. Vidrine confessed to the murder last Monday of Leo Wiggins, 27, son of Sheriff R. L. Wiggins, of Evangeline, the report said, adding that he had killed five persons previously. Three killings had been charged to Vidrine but in every instance there was not sufficient evidence to convict him. The state learned that Vidrine met Wiggins on a highway and asked him to lend him his auto. Upon refusal he shot Wiggins to death. Two crimes of a similar nature have been charged to the man. Two years ago a man was killed on a highway near Eunice and on the same day another man was killed on a highway near La Fayette, a short distance away. Ayak Elol Vidrine was arrested in these three instances. The killings remained mysteries.
