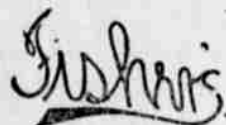

WOMAN AND CHILD SAVED FROM DEATH

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

INDEPENDENCE, Kansas, May 21.—Bearing bullet wounds, the bodies of Mrs. Harley Etter, 18, and her two year old baby, Helinda, were dragged from a burning barn on the Etter farm near here by officers searching for them.

Harley Etter, 23, the husband and father, is being held for questioning. He admitted, according to officers that he had quarreled with his wife recently, but denied any knowledge of the slayings.

Etter said his wife left home with the baby Monday noon to drive to the home of her parents, three miles away. He said he went to join her but found she had not arrived at the place.

After returning home, he said, he heard strange noises outside the house. He said he fired a shot through the front door and then went out and fired one shot into the air. A bullet hole was found in the door, and according to the authorities, Etter's rifle had been fired twice.
