PRESBYTERIANS WILL OPPOSE WAR

Willing to Protect Nation Against Invaders, but Are Against Fighting.

KEYNOTE SPEECH GIVEN

Meeting Which Convened Today Will Consider Resolutions Vigorously Opposing Wars.

—GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 22.—Dr. Clarence McCartney of Philadelphia was elected moderator of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America at the 156th general assembly of the church here today.

Dr. McCartney won the first ballot from Dr. Charles Erdman of Princeton, N. J., the vote being: McCartney 484; Erdman 446.

—GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 22.—Dr. Charles F. Wishart, retiring moderator opened the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in the United States of America today with a searching denunciation of warfare between nations and vigorous demand that the church take a determined stand toward abolishing it. He struck the keynote of Pacifism that is expected to sound through the assembly later when the anti-war overtures of the Chicago Presbytery are presented.

Dr. Wishart expressed the opinion that most of the commissioners attending the assembly would aid in the defense of the country from invasion of attack from without. But, he added, "if the church takes the position we must not shrink from its corollary."

That Corollary, he declared, is that the church must hereafter have something to say about "the reckless provoking of invasion by belligerent apostles of the jingo spirit at large."

—GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 22.—The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, which meets here today at the Fountain Street Baptist Church, will be called upon to pass on a number of big church problems. They include:

The contest between Fundamentalists and modernists, as involved in the preaching of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, a Baptist, in the First Presbyterian Church of New York.

The attitude of the Presbyterian Church toward the entire war system.

The question of equal rights of men and women to hold office in the Presbyterian Church.

The creation of a modern and effective pension system.

The movement to create at Washington a center for Presbyterian activities.

The sessions will open at 10 a. m. Thursday with the sermon by the retiring Moderator, Dr. Charles F. Wishart of Wooster, Ohio.

The first business session will begin at 2:30 with the election of a new Moderator and of standing committees. Presentation of annual official reports to Boards and executive bodies will be begun the morning of May 23.

Equal Rights Movement

What has been called an equal rights movement for women in the Presbyterian Church was launched at the General Assembly a year ago by Mrs. Charles Amory Blinn, president of the Woman's Missionary Society of Cincinnati Presbytery. At present only men can become elders and ministers, and only these are eligible for election to the Presbyteries and to the General Assembly.

The movement of the Cincinnati Women is "to remove from Presbyterian rules and regulations the restrictions in connection with the participation of women in the official affairs of the church." Mrs. Blinn complained then that the practical activities of Presbyterian women have been enlisted by the Red Cross, Y. W. C. A., and other organizations, and she wanted the power of the women conserved within the church work. During the past year the Cincinnati women have been busy getting petitions signed by women societies of the church asking the General Assembly to send down to the Presbyteries an overture to establish women's rights. These will be referred to the committee on bills and overtures, to be reported on later.

Attitude On War

Among the other documents thus to be considered is a memorial from Chicago Presbyterians asking the General Assembly to take cognizance of the world situation with respect to warlike preparations and to take steps to represent the mind of the Presbyterian Church against the entire war system. Chicago Presbyterians in this memorial petitions General Assembly to issue "a deliverance" opposing the anti-Christian philosophy which imagines or pretends that war is inevitable; to declare it to be our deliberate judgment that the war system as a system is fundamentally opposed to the teachings and example of Jesus and must be speedily abandoned; if civilization is to escape collapse; to affirm our unalterable conviction that any and all international problems can be permanently settled by conference and conciliation and, indeed, can be settled in no other way, and to pledge

our cooperation with other churches and with forward-looking men every where in a crusade for the swift outlawry of war by international agreement."

A considerable number of other Presbyteries have endorsed this or a similar memorial against war.

The Fosdick Case

While the General Assembly is determining the controversy caused by the action of Philadelphia Presbyterians protesting against the preaching in the First Presbyterian Church of New York of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, a Baptist, accused of heretical tendencies concerning the Virgin Birth and other fundamentals of the Presbyterian faith, Dr. Fosdick himself will be abroad. He is scheduled to deliver a series of lectures in Europe and to address the joint assembly of the State and Free Presbyterian Churches of Scotland at the same time that the Presbyterian General Assembly at Grand Rapids is considering his preaching in the New York church.

It is considered probable that the entire Fosdick matter will be referred to the Permanent Judicial Commission. This is the supreme court of the Presbyterian Church, aside from the General Assembly. The assembly votes either to accept or not to accept its findings.

No debate is permitted on such a vote. In case it votes not to accept, then the Assembly sits as an open court in trial of the case.

The Permanent Judicial Commission consists of both ministers and laymen, and its membership includes a number of distinguished lawyers.

Presbyterian Weeklies are outspoken in their editorial advice as to what the General Assembly ought to do in the Fosdick matter. The Herald and Presbyter of Cincinnati, Ohio, states editorially: "The New York First Presbyterian Church has been for two or three years not only harboring a heretical preacher, but has been doing so in violation of the express law of the church for just such possible and dangerous cases made and provided in its form of government. Such a condition should at once be corrected."

It will be noted that the General Assembly proceedings are not directed against Fosdick, over whom, as a Baptist, the Presbyterian Church has no jurisdiction, but against the First Presbyterian Church of New York, over which it has church control.

AVIATORS TAKE QUEEN FOR RIDE

Vernon Brookwater, and Joe Livermore, Vancouver, Washington, aviators, furnished a number of spectacular thrills for the carnival crowd this morning. The two fliers arrived here last night from Vancouver after being in the air for 2 hours and 20 minutes. They will remain over Thursday and Friday carrying passengers for flights over the city.

During the coronation ceremonies this morning the plane flew over the stand, and as the queen mounted her throne cast showers of roses over the crowd. Again as the crown was placed on the queen's head a shower of petals was cast from the swiftly moving plane and the crowd simply covered with the rain of flowers.

The plane used by the aviators is a 3-passenger Lincoln Standard, a rather slow moving steady plane, built for carrying weight rather than giving speed. METHODISTS ELECT GEORGE A. MILLER

—SPRINGFIELD, Mass., May 22.—Georgia A. Miller of South America was elected bishop of the Methodist Episcopal church by the general conference here today.

Bishop-elect Miller received 579 votes, with 551 necessary for election. The Rev. Titus Lowe of Nebraska was second with 542 and the Rev. George R. Grose, president of Depaw University of Indiana, was third with 494. It was said that Bishop-Elect Miller probably would be sent to the residence at Mexico City.

He was born in Mendon, Ill., in 1868 and graduated from Leland Stanford University in 1898, having been ordained a pastor in 1898. He served as a missionary in the Philippines and on the board of foreign missions in Philadelphia. After occupying various pastorates he became secretary of the South American area. His wife is Margaret Ross Miller, formerly of California. The couple have one daughter, Evelyn.

—SAN FRANCISCO, May 22.—Bishop-elect George A. Miller was pastor of the Fresno Methodist Episcopal church in 1901 and of the San Jose First Methodist Episcopal church in 1910.

"DEAD" MAN MAY STILL BE ALIVE

—SIOUX FALLS, S. D., May 22.—The war department records show that Arthur Frazier, Indian youth who enlisted at St. Charles, S. D., was killed in action in France, October 6, 1918.

Arthur Frazier, Indian, a victim of shell shock, without an army discharge and unable to tell how he returned from France and made his way to the west, sits in the home of the Frazier family at Fort Lookout, S. D., only partly rational at times. The parents and many of his former comrades say he is the real Arthur Frazier.

The war department files of finger prints show that the records of the man who enlisted at St. Charles are not those of the man at Fort Lookout.

American Legion officials say the finger print records may be erroneous.

The real Arthur Frazier was well educated, the son of an Indian clergyman of the Episcopal church, who held pastorates at St. Charles and Winner, S. D., when his son enlisted. After he went overseas they were notified that he was killed in action. A body was brought back as his and interred at Niobrara, Neb.

One day some months ago, the parents were notified that Arthur had been wandering in Oklahoma and 16 women who had relatives missing since the world war each claimed him. American Legion officials brought him to South Dakota. The parents identified him not only by personal appearance but by his scars and habits. But the war department officially did not know him.

His old company, recruited at Rochester, Minn., held a reunion which the mystery man attended and marched with the others.

"Hello Jim" and "Hello Bill," he cried out as he joyfully declared he recognized old comrades.

Many of them declare they remembered Arthur Frazier. Men who had not been in the company when he joined it he did not remember. Besides measurement of bones of the body buried and then exhumed it is planned to have a mental examination to provide a comparison with body buried and then exhumed it
