NEW MEAT MARKET OPENS SATURDAY

The Peoples Supply Company meat market will open for business Saturday morning. It was definitely announced by Mr. Hellwell today. The delay in receiving fixtures has caused the loss of three weeks of time. It was stated, but the refrigerating plant will be in working order by tonight, so that all meats can be properly cared for. The plant is one of the most complete in the state. The refrigerating plant is operated by electricity, and a temperature of zero can be maintained in the ice box, where the meat will be kept at all times. Cools running through the modern show cases permit of a low temperature where all cut meats will be displayed. A sausage mill with a capacity of 700 pounds per hour is in plain sight of customers, and the fixtures are all nickel. Marble counters and marble bases for show cases make an attractive combination. Screen for all doors leading into the store are being installed, and everything about the market appointments is conducive to sanitary conditions. Nothing has been left undone that might add to the facilities in serving customers.
