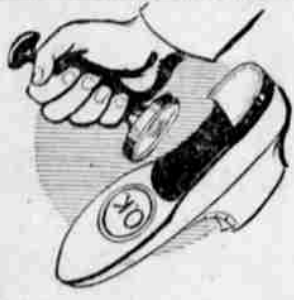

JURY RETURNS A VERDICT OF GUILTY

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) MOBILE, Ala., May 2.—The jury in the case of 14 defendants charged with conspiracy to violate the national prohibition act, returned a verdict today of guilty against 11 of the defendants in the federal district court.

The defendants convicted are: Harry B. O'Connor, Ben F. Cody, Perry Collins, Thomas Garwood, James Hayes, G. L. Donoghue, Don L. Jensen, Percy H. Kearns, John H. McEvoy, P. J. O'Shaughnessy and Geromino Perez. Kearns is an attorney and O'Shaughnessy is former chief of police, Donoghue, a former deputy sheriff.

GROUP WAREHOUSES BURNED LAST NIGHT

plies, poultry feed, and canned goods valued at about \$6,000.

The California Oregon Power company lost heavily in materials and supplies. There were several piles of cross arms, several miles of copper wire, insulators, transformer oil, paint, and other materials amounting in all to about \$10,000.

In S. B. Crouch's warehouse, the State Fish and Game Commission had stored a quantity of nails, and building supplies, valued at about \$150, while Stearns and Chenoweth of Oakland, and S. B. Crouch, lost a carload of wire fencing, and a quantity of barbed wire and hardware supplies.

The Southern Pacific company's loss will be light, according to Superintendent King. The passenger coaches which were damaged will be sent in to the repair shops where the warped sides can be pounded back into shape by air hammers, and a new finish put on. The running gear was not injured. It was found necessary to replace several lengths of track which was warped by the intense heat.

During the progress of the fire it was feared several times that the blaze would get away from the group of warehouses and set fire to other buildings, in which case it would have been almost impossible to have saved the south end of town.

Embers were strewn as far as Miller's Addition, and many homes were endangered. George Staley's store on Sheridan street caught fire twice. A fire was found on the roof of Mel Thompson's home on Lane street. The roof on one of Councilman Powell's homes on Pine street also caught fire and a fire was started at the home of Mrs. Currier on Mosher street. All of these, however, were handled with garden hoses, as the residents were on the lookout for these dangers.

The buildings destroyed were very old structures. One of them, according to Judge Bidde, who aided in its construction, was built in 1873, the year following the arrival of the railroad in Roseburg. It was built on a cooperative basis by a number of farmers and used as a storage place for wool.

The fire put the Western Union wires out of commission for a short time, as the burning poles carried out the telegraph wires. However, an emergency line was quickly strung, and communication restored in a short space of time.

COMMITTEE CALLS MORE WITNESSES

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.) WASHINGTON, May 22.—Hiram C. Todd, special assistant to the attorney-general in charge of prosecuting Gaston B. Means, appeared today before the senate Daugherty commission to deny previous testimony as to his connection with detective activities directed against the committee and its witnesses.

Turning aside temporarily from examination of witnesses relating to corruption charges, the special federal grand jury received more technical information today regarding the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve. A. W. Ambrose and P. B. Toussaint of the interior department were questioned and the jury then adjourned until Tuesday. The list of witnesses is fairly well exhausted and if the prompt attendance of some of them sought can be secured the inquiry probably will be concluded within a week or ten days.

HAROLD LLOYD PROUD FATHER

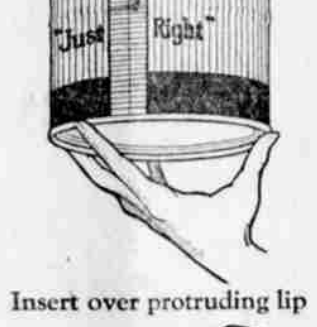

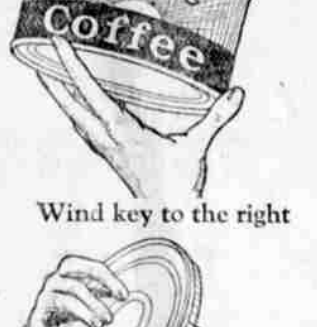
