

### MEDIUM FAILS TO PRODUCE SPIRITS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PORTLAND, May 22.—W. V. Aber, accused of fraud in the practice of his profession of spiritualistic medium, attempted last night to give a demonstration in circuit court before a jury of his ability to materialize a spirit but after an hour's effort gave up, saying that the atmosphere of the court was too stuffy and not sufficiently harmonious to permit a successful test.

The seance had been arranged at Aber's request. He had told Judge Johnson that he could prove by material test his ability to materialize spirits before the jury's eyes. The court consented to the test. A cabinet was set up in the grand jury room. Lights were dimmed almost. Aber contended they were not sufficiently dimmed—and a contest of Aber's fellow spiritists was held to adjust the matter. The seance was attended by the jury, Judge and a few newspaper men, in addition to Aber and his assistants. Aber and his assistants manned the cabinet and a circle was formed. There was a wait. It was extended. The tension, first apparent among the spectators, gradually relaxed. Nothing happened, and finally Aber announced that he would force the effort. Then he collapsed in what his assistants called a trance, but he was revived on and court was adjourned.

Aber's case is in circuit court on appeal from municipal court where he was convicted of false testimony on testimony of several persons who declared they sat in at his seances. At one of these seances, according to testimony, the lights suddenly turned up and the spirit seemed, later turning out to be Aber himself, wrapped in a sheet.

Arguments by attorneys were made to the jury today. The case is expected to go to the jury today.

L. B. Sandblast, Portland attorney who is defending Aber in his trial, a well known man in this vicinity, has made his residence here for a number of years. He moved to Portland some years ago where he has been practicing law since.

### CONFERENCE TAKES UP RECREATION

WASHINGTON, May 23.—The attention of the national conference on outdoor recreations was turned today to the recreation resources of America, with Secretaries Work and

Hoover, assigned the posts of honorary chairman of the two sessions and a number of authorities presenting papers on various aspects of the general topic.

The list of speakers this morning include Robert Sterling Yard, executive secretary of the National Parks Association and Brighton Moore secretary of the council of national parks, forest and wild life.

Mr. Yard, in his paper, urged an immediate government survey of the science resources of the United States embraced in the publicly owned lands and declared a "new national park, monument and forest systems."

Moore, speaking as an individual, outlined in his paper a program for a national outdoor recreational policy with special reference to the work of federal agencies. He joined in urging a survey and classification of the public lands, declaring "it is apparent that the land which is kept for public ownership should be administered."

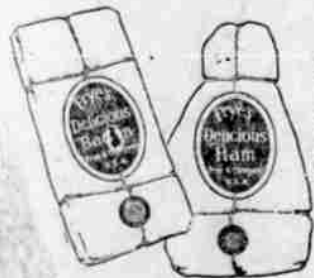
