REDUCTION BILL LOOKS FAVORABLE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, May 24.—The conference report on the tax reduction bill was before the senate today with prompt approval in prospect. The house bill act on report Monday and if approved there the bill will be ready for President Coolidge's consideration. Leaders generally predict its signature by the president.

The report is a compromise between the senate and the house bills carrying the senate democratic income rate schedules and the house provision for limited publicity of returns and no change in the present corporation tax. The vote on approving the report was 60 to 6.

In adjusting differences between the senate and the house, the conference adopted the senate income rate schedule but turned down other major provisions adopted in the senate by the democratic-republican insurgent coalition.

Rejection of the amendment proposed by Senator Norris, republican, Nebraska, opening all tax returns to public inspection was off set somewhat however, by the conference's action in approving an amendment requiring publication of the amount paid by each tax payer. The conference also argued upon the provision permitting inspection of returns by certain congressional committees.

The amendment proposed by Senator Jones, dem. crat. New Mexico, substituting for the present flat corporation tax of 12 per cent a normal rate of 9 per cent with a graduated scale of surtaxes levied on undistributed profits above ten per cent was regretted.

Despite the protests of the treasury, the senate pushed forward to a vote of approval today on the conference tax bill. In the closing hours of the debate, republican and democratic leaders alike asserted the measure would not result in a deficit next year unless congress approved various special appropriations. Chairman Smoot of the finance committee conceded that all of the budget estimates including next year's bonus expenses could be met and that a small surplus still would be left.

President Coolidge withheld any indication of his verdict on the measure and began a series of conferences with those best able to provide him with the argument on both sides of the question.

WILL PRESENT CASE TO FEDERAL JURY

INDEPENDENCE, Calif., May 24.—A special investigator from the district attorney's office in Los Angeles left here yesterday with an announced intention of laying before the federal grand jury information he has gathered in connection with the recent dynamiting of the Los Angeles aqueduct near Lone Pine.

He has learned, he said, that between 40 and 50 men assembled in Healdsburg, near Big Pine, about 10 o'clock Tuesday night. Four persons, he said, asserted they counted eleven autos passing through this place about 11:15 or the same night. The explosion took place at 1:15 Wednesday morning and shortly after that time, according to his information, ten of the cars returned leaving one car, presumably to see that the dynamite was exploded.

Two 50 pound boxes of dynamite are reported missing from the Waterson Power House at Bishop.

At Bishop last night A. H. Swallow, an attorney of Los Angeles, declared that he had foretold the dynamiting after listening to threats of Owens Valley ranchers, who blamed the aqueduct for carrying away water for their parched lands. Swallow expressed the belief that dissatisfied employes and not ranchers had placed the dynamite.

TENNESSEE IS BEHIND M'ADOO

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 23.—Tennessee's delegates to the national democratic convention will leave instructed to cast their vote for William G. McAdoo for the presidential nomination. Turmoil and confusion prevailed during the state convention which late yesterday decided to instruct for McAdoo by a vote of 1300 to 740.

Hoyt Stewart, state campaign manager for Senator Underwood and Matt Whittaker, of Chattanooga, speaking for McAdoo, led the discussion. The disturbance started while Tom Preston of Chattanooga, speaking for McAdoo, was recognized on the floor of the convention.

The storm was permitted to subside only at the roll call and after the discussion of the convention was announced on the instruction of delegates, half of the delegates, fled from the hall cheering for McAdoo.

William G. McAdoo declared last night that the sending of a Tennessee delegation to the democratic convention with instruction to vote for him had assured him of the presidential nomination. Tennessee was the last state, he said, needed to be sure of the victory.

JAP DIET REGRETS EXCLUSION ACTION

TOKIO, May 24.—A meeting of the leaders of every party in the upper and lower houses of the diet, including several former cabinet ministers and members of the nobility adopted a resolution expressing regret at the passage of the immigration bill and their resolve to use their efforts to restrain the effect produced among their people.

OFFICIAL VIEW GIVEN COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON, May 24.—The view of the state department on the immigration bill with its provision of exclusion of Japanese emigrants after July 1, were presented formally to President Coolidge today in a report compiled by Secretary Hughes after study of the measure.

Mr. Coolidge is expected to act soon upon the measure but White House officials were not prepared to predict whether his decision would be announced today.

The probable action of the executive has been increasingly a matter of speculation and officials who several days ago spoke of "an arrangement" which might lead him to sign the bill, declined flatly today to discuss the question in any way.

FRENCH AVIATOR TO CONTINUE TRIP

SHANGHAI, May 24.—Captain Pelletier Dolsy, the French aviator, has fixed the time for his departure for Nanking, on his way to Japan via Peking and Korea, for daylight Monday.

A Paris cable last night announced that the minister of aeronautics had decided that Dolsy's flight officially ended when he crashed at Shanghai but that the aviator might unofficially complete his flight to Tokio in a new plane.
