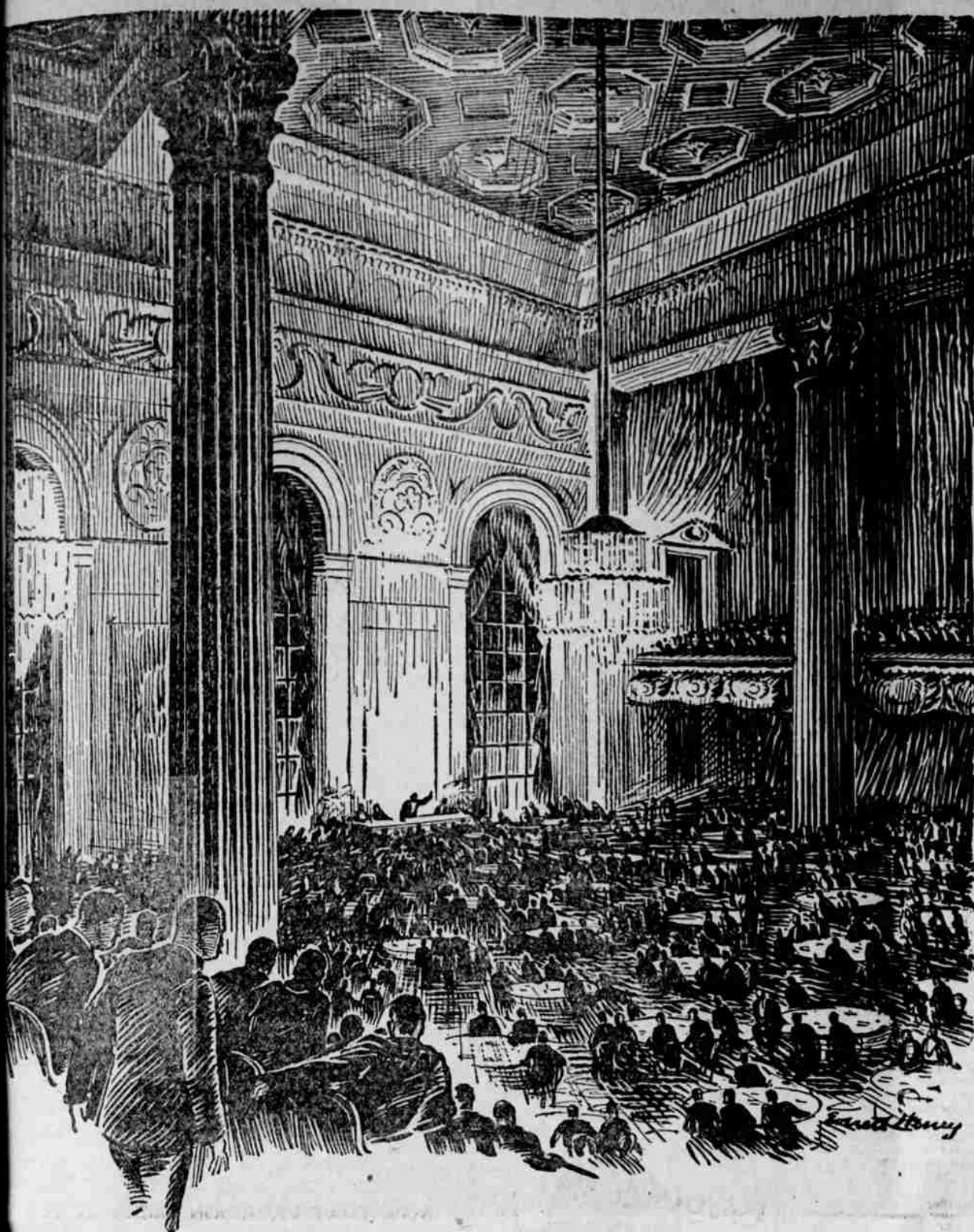

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TELEGRAPHIC SPARKS

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Representative Mondell of Wyoming and officials of the Internal Revenue Bureau and two Washington banks were among the witnesses today before the special oil grand jury in the District of Columbia supreme court.

Income tax returns of Albert B. Fall and other central figures in the naval oil case scandal were inquired into as were certain bank transactions.

PORTLAND, May 27.—The special grand jury which has been investigating county affairs was reported ready today to take action "on findings which were being prepared by attorneys who have been directing the probe. The attorneys were busy with a court stenographer at work on documents to be submitted to the inquisitorial body.

The attorneys to the two suits growing out of the bridge awards conferred with Judge Taxwell Tuesday morning when it developed that no outside judge could be obtained at once to try the cases. It is expected that one of them—the injunction action brought by W. W. Rucker to prevent the old commissioners from proceeding with the work—will be dropped since its purpose was satisfied when the new commissioners abrogated the contracts. The other, brought by District Attorney Stanley Myers to obtain a legal ruling invalidating the contracts—will probably

go forward as soon as Judge Taxwell can obtain an outside judge.

The cases were to be taken up by Circuit Judge Bingham but he intends to leave Thursday to take care of his own docket.

WAREHOUSES TO BE REBUILT

Owners of Lease Are Planning on Constructing Buildings in Near Future.

WILL BE OF CONCRETE

New Structures Will Be Fire-proof With Various Sections Separated by Fire Walls.

Construction of new warehouses to replace the four destroyed by fire last week will probably be undertaken in the near future. Plans are already being discussed and it is anticipated that action will be taken soon to construct new buildings, as the demand for warehouse and storage space is such that the room will be demanded.

It is very probable that the owners will get together and will construct a uniform building, of concrete or other fireproof material, and will separate their sections with firewalls, so that there can be no recurrence of last week's bad blaze.

The property on which these buildings stood is owned by the Southern Pacific company but is held under a 99 year lease. The property was given to the railroad company by Aaron Rose, and the company in turn gave him a lease on it. This lease still has about 60 years to run, and is owned by the group of men who owned buildings on the land. A fee only sufficient to hold the lease is required each year by the company.

It is planned to start rebuilding at once, and James Newland has already started cleaning up his section with a view of erecting a new building at a very near date. George Kohlhaugen has not yet determined upon his action, but prefers to delay for a short time owing to the high cost of building material. O. J. Lundsey is anxious to go ahead as soon as possible, as he finds that he has a great need for storage room. S. B. Crouch is also in need of room and will probably rebuild at an early date although he has not yet made definite plans.

The plan has been advanced for the various owners to get together and adopt specifications for a uniform structure, which would be built on a co-operative basis. Each section would be separated from the others by a fire wall, which would practically eliminate any danger from fire and would give a low insurance rate, and at the same time stimulate and encourage the storage of goods in the building.
