NOTE ON DEAD MAN LEADS TO ARREST

PORTLAND, May 27.—Through addresses found on the person of a logger killed at work near Reedsport, Glendora Ryan, indicted here in connection with a vice ring that reached its tentacles around several high school girls, has been arrested in Seattle. Constable Glass held the warrant for the woman's arrest on charges of contributing to the delinquency of minors, and his office was active in tracing the woman, aided by the Portland police bureau.

Among letters found on the body of a logger by the name of Phillips, accidentally killed near Reedsport, were some he had received from the Ryan woman. They asked him for money. She was living in Seattle, as had been suspected, but under the name of Davis.

There was no scandal in disclosures made when the vice ring which the woman was alleged to have headed was broken up. It was alleged that she had given many wild parties both at the address where she was then located, 718 Union avenue, and on East Broadway, where she formerly lived. High school girls were found to have been taken to these orgies by men. At times the Ryan woman was said to have sent men to bring the girls. It was said also that prominent citizens whose names were never disclosed had attended some of the parties.

According to word received by Constable Glass, who left last night for the prisoner, she is willing to come and face the charges.

VICTOR HERBERT IS DEAD IN NEW YORK

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, May 27.—Victor Herbert, composer and orchestra conductor, is dead and today tokens began pouring in showing the esteem in which the country held the man who enriched its music with scores of waltzes and operettas, and gave this country in "Natoma" one of its first native grand operas. He died yesterday of an apoplectic malady. He was 65 years old. Mr. Herbert was born in Dublin, Ireland, the grandson of Samuel Lover, the novelist. He was at the age of seven studying music in Germany under leading masters. It was a violin-cello virtuoso that he entered the music world and came to the United States.

Best known for his waltzes and comic operas, Mr. Herbert, an indefatigable worker to the last, preferred to be known for his contributions to serious opera.

LOCAL S. P. MEN TO FORM ASSOCIATION

Nearly 150 employees of the southern Pacific company in this city will meet at the Macabee Hall at 7:30 o'clock tonight for the purpose of organizing Roseburg Lodge No. 273 of the United Association of Railway Employees of the Northwest. H. E. Goff, of Portland, general chairman of the association for the Portland district, is here to present the charter and the local railroaders will elect their officers tonight.

The organization is open to all railroad employees from water boy to the general manager's chief clerk. It represents a movement which is designed to overturn the 15 railroad crafts organizations, and to amalgamate into one big union all railroad employees of all the various departments.

According to the organizer the railroad men are receptive to the movement and no effort is required to obtain their applications for membership. The four arrested men were whisked away to Seattle by Sheriff Starwick and Conn, and will probably be taken to the Skagit county jail in Mount Vernon late in the day.

All of the arrested men denied the allegations charged against them through Attorney A. O. Burmeister, who will represent them.

The quartet was arrested within 10 minutes of each other by a large force of Tacoma officers. The work was divided and the four alleged robbers were brought to jail at the same time.

In the holdup of the Anacortes bank, the four are said to have used revolvers and rifles in holding up President W. T. Odlin and Edna Odlin, employee of the bank. After the hold up the quartet is said to have used an automobile in escaping.

President Odlin was shot and wounded.

HOPE COOLIDGE FAVORS TAX BILL

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, May 27.—Republican organization leaders were hopeful today that President Coolidge would make an early and favorable decision on the tax reduction bill sent to him yesterday by congress.

In addition to receiving the overwhelming endorsement of both the senate and a house of only fifteen votes having been cast against it—the measure was declared by treasury department officials analyzing it to be an improvement over the present laws.

The bill was sent upon its receipt at the White House yesterday to the treasury department for analysis by Secretary Mellon.

The measure presents little of the original tax plan advanced by Secretary Mellon and asked of congress by the president.

While only nine republicans in the house and still in the senate voted against the bill as finally framed in conference, a large number, it was indicated, should be counted on to support a veto.

Republican leaders expressed the belief, however, that a veto would be over-ridden.

AMERICANS TO AID THE BRITISH FLIGHT

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) TOKIO, May 27.—The American destroyer John Paul Jones left Yokohama this morning for Hakodate to pick up a reserve plane belonging to a Stuart MacLaren, British aviator on his way around the world and take it on to Hong Kong, whence it will be taken on by another destroyer to Calcutta. The plane will replace that which crashed with MacLaren near Tkyah, Burma, in an accident which it was feared might terminate MacLaren's effort.

Today's action followed approval by Admiral Thomas Washington, commanding the United States Asiatic Fleet, of plans for helping the British flight.

The remainder of the forty third destroyer division of the American fleet will leave Yokohama tomorrow to take up stations along the route to be followed by the American army's around the world fliers on their way from Kagoshima to Shanghai.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEWARK, May 27.—Six men are known to have died in a fire today which destroyed the Windsor hotel on Halsey street. Firemen said other bodies probably were in the debris. The hotel housed 100 men last night.

A policeman reported seeing three men go to a fire escape door, only to be enveloped in flames.

The hotel was a four story frame structure with a tire shop on the street floor.

A dense smoke hampered firemen.

FEMININE RACE FANS BESTOW LUCK TOKENS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) INDIANAPOLIS, May 27.—Feminine race fans have responded so heartily to Earl Cooper's request for good luck tokens to protect him during the 500 miles automobile race here Friday that his garage resembles a curiosity shop.

The veteran pilot has received cats, dogs, lockets, photographs, gold coins, silver mounted rabbits' feet, ivory elephants, four leaf clovers, ivory bound locks of hair, pieces of jade, luck rings and many other knickknacks. In the past races, Cooper has been well up among the leaders until near the end when something would happen to his motor.

"I've got enough luck now to win a dozen races and still it comes," Cooper said. He indicated that he was almost in as bad a fix now as before—he's worried over which of the tokens is the luckiest one. "I'd have to carry a trailer in the race to carry all my luck pieces. I am wallowing in luck and Lady Luck is my sweetheart from today on," he said.

Many of the luck pieces have histories of their own and the senders have requested that they be returned after the race. A girl in Omaha sent a belt buckle that had deflected a piece of shrapnel and saved her sweetheart's life in France. A woman in Memphis sent a worn twenty five cent piece that had been in the five cent piece that had been in the family since the civil war. One young woman living in Brooklyn, offered herself as Cooper's Goddess of Luck.

Cooper's luck may already have taken a turn for the better, for yesterday he qualified his machine at a rate of 103 miles—well up among the leaders. Eighteen others also qualified, leaving only ten to take their trials today and tomorrow.
