SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION SOON

Two Directors to Be Chosen
at Election to Be Held
on June 16.

CANDIDATES ARE FEW

Finlay Will Accept Office if
Elected—Bellows Will Not
Run—Crocker and
Kidder Mentioned.

A school election will be held on Monday June 16, for the purpose of electing two directors to take the offices made vacant by the expiration of the terms of Chairman A. J. Bellows, and Director G. C. Finlay. The election will be held at the high school and all residents of the school district who are registered voters will be qualified to vote.

The two retiring directors have been very faithful and efficient men in this capacity. Mr. Bellows has served for eight years, and has taken a keen and active interest in school affairs during his two terms. Dr. Finlay has also been a very active member of the board and has given much time from his business to aid in handling the district's affairs.

Mr. Bellows emphatically declares that he will not accept the office for another term. He has served very ably for eight years and feels that he has discharged his duty to the school district. The job is a thankless one at best and is accepted only through a sense of responsibility.

Dr. Finlay states that he is not seeking the office, and will make no effort for reelection. However, his friends have demanded that he allow his name to go before the voters for reelection, and although he will make no campaign he says he will accept the position again if it is the desire of the voters of the district that he do so.

Several other names have been mentioned, but as yet no candidates have announced themselves. L. L. Crocker, proprietor of the Pioneer Drug Store, and a prominent business man of the city, has been mentioned and will probably be one of those nominated. Stanley Kidder, is also freely mentioned as a candidate. Mr. Kidder has been very active in school affairs for several years.

PLOT IS DISCOVERED

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)
TOKIO, May 29.—Discovery of an alleged Korean plot to bomb the American and British consulates in Seoul Korea is causing some uneasiness there, press dispatches indicate.

Semi-official confirmation has been given to a report that special guards have been posted at the American consulate. It is said that the guard will be kept there for the present. It is learned that the United States consul has been advised directly as well as by the Japanese police of the alleged plot.

The bombing plan is believed by officials to have originated with the Korean "provisional government" which was formed in 1919 in Shanghai by Koreans opposed to Japanese rule in their native country. Every effort is being made by officials to prevent any outrage against the American consulate at Seoul, fearing any such incident would be particularly trouble-

FARM NEWS

DAMPING OFF PREVENTED BY CHESTNUT TREATMENT

Damping off or foot rot of young seedlings can be prevented quite easily by the use of the "chestnut compound," according to M. B. McKay, associate plant pathologist of the O. A. C. experiment station. Damping off occurs mostly in seedlings for early transplanting. Seedlings of tomatoes, egg plant, cabbage and broccoli are most commonly affected.

Control of damping off formerly consisted almost solely in preventing the malady by disinfecting the soil before the seeds were planted. The soil was usually sterilized by hot water, steam, or formaldehyde. If the soil became contaminated after the seed was planted there was no method of checking its development.

The chestnut compound is prepared by mixing two ounces of finely powdered copper sulfate and 11 ounces finely powdered ammonium carbonate. Store for not less than 24 hours in a tightly corked glass or stone jar and then dissolve one ounce of the dry mixture in a little hot water, making up two gallons. Large quantities may be prepared in the same proportions. The mixture gradually loses its strength if kept long. It should be stored in glass or stone as iron or zinc are corroded by it.

The solution is used to thoroughly water the soil after the seeds are planted and covered. One pint is enough for a box 14 by 9 by 2 inches. Seedlings transplanted into infected soil may be protected by watering with the solution as soon as they are set. If they are left over night before being treated many may become infected and the treatment for them will be rendered useless. If the disease appears the plant can be removed as soon as attacked, the hole watered with one pint of the solution, a healthy plant inserted and the box again treated with the solution.

Cultivation of row crops in Oregon should begin while the weeds are small, says the experiment station. The first cultivations are usually made with a harrow or weeder and later cultivations with a toothed cultivator. The cultivator should be run about three inches deep or just deep enough to stir the soil sufficiently to kill weeds and cover up weeds in the row. In some instances on rather hard soils, deep early cultivation should be made.

Land for kale should be well manured and after plowing must be kept clean of weeds until planting time, which is usually after a favorable rain in June. Kale plants should be set deep to make them

grow close to the ground and avoid excessively tall stalks in the field. The experiment station finds. The tall stalks are more susceptible to winter injury.

For late planting for hog or poultry feed the experiment station finds Japanese or silver hull buck wheat offers most promise. It is sowed like grain on a well prepared seed bed any time from the middle of May to the end of June. Forty-five pounds of seed are used per acre. It usually keeps growing as long as the moisture lasts, or until frost stops it. It is especially valuable for poultry feed and for sale to millers.

SITUATION IN JAPAN SERIOUS

(Associated Press Licensed Wire.)

TOKIO, May 29.—The depressing atmosphere induced by the enactment in the United States of exclusion legislation applying to Japanese hung heavily tonight over the first important gathering of Americans and Japanese since the immigration bill was signed—the farewell dinner of the America-Japan retiring Ambassador Cyrus E. Woods. It persisted despite the efforts of everyone present to avoid the subject of exclusion.

An impressive moment during the dinner came when Viscount Kaneko, president of the society, arose and proposed the health of President Coolidge—less than 24 hours after word had reached Tokyo that the president had signed the immigration bill.

Viscount Kaneko, in paying tribute to Ambassador Woods and the work he had done in Japan, deviated a moment to compliment the newspaper America on their attitude in the present difficulties.

"In the fifty two years since I was a school boy in Boston, I've followed the American newspapers," he said. "But I've never seen anything like the unbounded sympathy they have shown in this crisis for Japan. I never have seen any such consideration shown for any foreign country. It is unprecedented in the history of American journalism. The majority of the United States newspapers have stood for the right and have been true friends in need."

"It is idle to pretend that these are not trying times," he said, "but it is in such moments of stress as these that men are most truly tested and their innate qualities revealed. At this moment I have nothing but praise for their attitude of the Japanese nation. The calm and dignity with which the Japanese are conducting themselves are worthy of the traditions of your great and noble nation."

The ambassador also paid tribute to

the stand taken by President Coolidge and Secretary Hughes in the immigration controversy.
