NEW YORK, May 29.—The committee of 48 has decided to send delegates to the Cleveland convention of the conference for progressive political action on July 4 and bring about the nomination of Senator La Follette of Wisconsin for the presidency on a third party ticket. It has withdrawn from the St. Paul June 17th convention because of the senator's attack on that meeting yesterday. J. A. H. Hopkins, chairman of the committee of 48, and also a member of the arrangements committee of the St. Paul meeting, declared he would urge all progressive groups to stay away from St. Paul because the communists had planned to seize the convention.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Further inquiry into the fuel oil contracts of the fleet corporation by the house committee investigating the shipping board is expected to follow taking of testimony yesterday bringing the names of former Secretary Fall and the Sinclair Oil Company into the evidence. The committee was in recess today but will resume its hearings Saturday.

ATTORNEY STARTS LIBEL ACTION

M. RSHFIELD, May 29.—A. K. Peck, well known attorney, today filed suit against the Times Publishing company and M. C. Maloney, publisher and editor, for many alleged libelous and scandalous articles which have been printed against him during the past two years.

Based his claim for damages on two exceptionally bitter attacks which have been printed within the past year. Mr. Peck said that the fact that the Times has attempted to make people believe he is an unprincipled man and guilty of dishonest and deceitful practices.

The complaint, which was filed with the county clerk today, refers back to the issue of the Times of May 28, 1923, when the newspaper printed a front page article in which the plaintiff is referred to as a "double crosser," a "charlatan," a "hate-baiter," and a man who commercialized the Christian religion for profit.

Reference is also made to an article appearing on the afternoon of May 29, 1923, captioned, "The Harvest of Hate," in which the Times stated: "Peck has sought to promote his political fortunes and prestige by appeals to the basest of all human emotions, 'hat of hate.'"

The plaintiff sets forth that these malicious and defamatory articles were printed for the sole purpose and intent of injuring him in his profession, and to defame and maliciously annoy him and bring him into public hatred and contempt.
