CONVENTION NIGHTS WILL SEE NEW YORK ABLAZE WITH LIGHTS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, May 31—The show places of Manhattan will be clothed at night, during the Democratic Convention, in a mantle of incandescent cones beside which the Great White Way will pale into insignificance.

The Fifth Avenue Association will rival Broadway by keeping its gorgeously decorated shop windows uncurtained at night, by flooding them with "color symphonies" of electric light.

Searchlights will be brought by the Merchants Association to play upon the towering pinnacles of the Metropolitan, Woolworth and other tall buildings whose lofty crests also will be lined against the sky by strings of smaller lamps.

The "Golden Way", which was erected in honor of celebrated allied leaders who visited America during the world war, will be lighted once more.

Business men's organizations are busy with other plans for keeping convention visitors interested. The Fifth Avenue and the Thirty-fourth Street Associations will install in front of each of their members shops a man who will be a walking bureau of information.

LIMITED PARKING ADVISED TO SOLVE TRAFFIC JAMS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) ALBANY, May 30.—Traffic experts of New York state have recommended the discontinuance of parking cars in congested districts as a relatively easy solution of the automobile problem.

Eventual prohibition of parking must come, the report of the experts says. "In view of the fact that traffic will continue to increase and that attempts to relieve congestion by parking time limitations, traffic diversion and other restrictions do not satisfactorily and finally care for the interests of the public generally, the merchant and the automobile owner."
