The Daily Vacation Bible School is a school set on to utilize a part of the vacation time of the child in delightful and intensely profitable learning. Bible drills, stories, music, memory work, play, worship, expressional periods, hand work, all are pleasingly presented in a way the children enjoy, tying God's laws to their everyday lives.

A school of this kind is to be given by the Christian Church for the whole community. This is done at considerable cost to this church, but absolutely without cost to any child attending. The only thought behind it is the community service we are able to give.

All we ask is that you allow your child to have the pleasures of this school and receive its benefits. Children of other churches, children of no church, any child from anywhere is welcome to this school, up to its capacity. Please start them the first day and please have them regular in attendance.

The Christian Church school starts next Monday, June 2nd, and continues 4 weeks. Sessions are held five days a week, from 9:00 to 11:45 each morning.

The children meet in 3 groups, the kindergarten for 5 and 6 year olds, primary for 7 and 8 year olds, junior for 9, 10, 11 and 12 year olds. Each section is under a competent paid teacher and helpers. Equipment and supplies are for the most part furnished.

Our work is open for inspection at all times and at the end of the school a review will be given and will convince everyone of the wonderful worth of a school of this kind.

about - A BIG BONFIRE

"Many of them brought their books together and burned them before all men."

Here was a big book bonfire; the price of it was estimated at about \$9,000 of our money. These books were bad books; they were the books of those who used curious arts in the old and wicked city of Ephesus.

But there would have been no such fire of bad books had there not been a big belief in the old Book and the Christ who had come in the fulfillment of its words. There's another big bonfire of bad books due right now. The Devil has been inspiring more bad books in the last fifty years than ever before. And some of them seem to be the very essence of life and the very brightness and purity of light; and yet, they are in reality the very pitchiness of darkness. They are the books used by men of curious arts to mislead the faith and to substitute froth, the froth of thought—Independent thought.

But there will be no burning of these books today nor tomorrow without a spreading of a great flame of that faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord, such as in the old Ephesus days swept over all "Asia" and resulted in a condition described in the nineteenth of Acts as, "So mightily grew the word of God and prevailed." Would God we had that flame. Would God the books of unfaith were burned. Would God the Word might now mightily prevail. "Even so, Come Lord Jesus."

JAPS AROUSING
HATRED FOR U. S.

Jingoists Fan Flame of Anti-American Feeling to a White Heat.

MEETINGS ARE CALLED

Newspapers Attempt to Cause Trouble Between Two Countries and Backed by Many Politicians.

(Associated Press Learned Wire.)

TOKIO, May 29.—Anti-American feeling engendered by enactment of the United States immigration law with its Japanese exclusion provisions threatens to become more widespread and intense, backed as it is by the Jingo press and a small group of nationalistic publicists, politicians, former service men and retired officers of the army and navy. Official Japan, represented by the Kiyoura government, absolutely opposes any retaliatory measures and although Viscount Kato remains silent upon that point, it is generally believed in high quarters that the new ministry he is expected to form within a fortnight, will continue the same policy.

With this contradiction of public and certain private opinion so in evidence, Japanese officials express regret that they are unable entirely to control the anti-American expressions which are outcropping almost daily in public meetings, published editorials and newspaper advertisements. Propaganda is clearly under way to persuade the public to refuse purchase of American goods and demand instead Japanese or European goods.

Some papers, still insist that the move to restrict imports is a direct result of the American immigration policy. The group of nationalistic publicists, headed by Shinkichi Ueyasu, professor of political science at the Imperial Tokyo University, is promoting a series of what they call "national spirit meetings," with the avowed purpose of arousing the national spirit against the exclusion measure.

One of these meetings has been called for June 6 in the great wrestling hall here, one of the largest meeting places in the city. The date was selected, Ueyasu explained today, because it is that upon which Ambassador Woods, (the retiring American ambassador) will leave. The nationalists, he explained, do not wish to embarrass the ambassador, whose sympathy for the Japanese makes it quite impossible for the Japanese to take resolute measures while he is still here.

Ueyasu and his followers are planning ten similar meetings to be held in the other principal cities of the empire during the month of June.

TOKIO, May 29.—Japan's protest to America upon enactment of the immigration bill with its clause barring Japanese from entering the United States will not be given out for publication here before it is decoded in Washington and placed in the hands of Secretary of State Hughes.

This was made known here today.

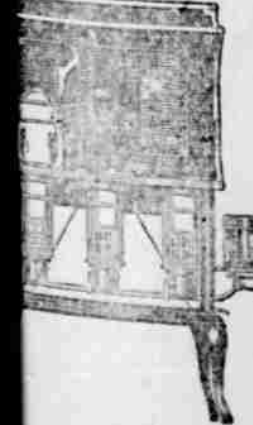
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
