BUNDLE DAY SET FOR WEDNESDAY

Mayor Proclaims June 4 as Day for Collection of Clothing for Near East.

GREAT NEED REPORTED

Reliable Statements From American Workers Tell Terrible Conditions of Destitution.

Wednesday, June 4 has been proclaimed by Mayor N. Rice as Bundle Day for the Near East relief, and residents of the city are asked to make up all of the old clothing which they can spare into bundles and leave them at the Presbyterian church where they will be boxed up and shipped to the Near East Commission to be used for the relief of the distressed inhabitants and refugees.

The near east problem has been a distressing one for several years, and reports of continued suffering and destitution still come from those lands. Committees which have been interested in this work in the past, are continuing their efforts and relief is still being afforded from this country.

One of the greatest needs at present is clothing. Many of the refugees were driven out of Turkey losing all of their possessions and now have very little clothing and no funds. Clean clothing of all kinds, particularly for children, is badly needed and an appeal is being made to the residents of Douglas county to aid in this work.

Mayor Rice is endeavoring to aid in the work and has issued an official proclamation setting June 4 as bundle day, and giving a formal appeal in connection with the relief effort. The mayor's proclamation is as follows:

Reliable reports reaching me the last few days indicate extreme distress among the refugees driven from their homes in Turkey last year, to find any possible kind of shelter in Greece. There are at least 500,000 ill clad, under-nourished people, although two years ago many were in comfortable circumstances as we are.

Americans of unquestioned standing including our own Oregonians like Miss Cornelia Marvin, state librarian, and Mrs. C. S. Jackson of the Oregon Journal, and Prof. Wm. J. Sly of McMinnville unite both in stressing the overwhelming need and the sacrifices made by the American Relief workers to meet the need.

The children of Roseburg have been collecting milk, for milk is one of the greatest needs of the orphans. Funds are desperately needed, and clothing is second in importance only to money.

Since a nation wide appeal is being made for clothes, and since other cities in Oregon are rallying to this need, and since Roseburg is never second to any community in any good work.

Therefore, I, Mayor N. Rice of Roseburg, do hereby designate June 4, as Bundle Day for Near East Relief and urge all our good citizens to bring or send their bundle to the Presbyterian church that it may be forwarded to the sufferers in the Near East.

DOUGLAS COUNTY DAY AT O. A. C. ON JUNE 20

One day each year is set aside by the Oregon Agricultural College to receive visiting farmers and their wives from each county. Plans are made upon these days to entertain these visitors by field trips and other interesting visits to the various departments of the college. Every visitor is given an opportunity to examine the experimental grain plots, forage and grass demonstrations, results secured from drainage and irrigation, demonstration orchards and berry fields. Other trips will include visits to modern poultry plant, dairy barns, livestock barns and all the college buildings in which the visitors are interested.

The trip is very interesting and instructive to all those who are interested in the progress of agriculture. Parents are also enabled to meet deans of the various educational departments and go over with them plans for the attendance of their boys and girls at college the following school year.

Douglas county day will be June 20th. The driving time from Roseburg to Corvallis is about three hours.

General assembly for the day's program commences each day at 10 o'clock in the morning at Administration Building. A large number of Douglas county farmers should take one day off and enjoy this visit to the best agricultural college in the west.
