HOUSE TAKES NO RECESS; TOO BUSY

(Associated Press Leased Wire)
WASHINGTON, May 30.—With a vote on the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill in prospect by tomorrow night, the house today, unlike the senate, took no memorial day recess, but plunged into the flood of amendments sweeping against the measure when it was laid aside Saturday.

House members generally predicted a close decision on the bill, which makes provision for a \$200,000,000 corporation to export surplus farm products. Only two of its 23 pages had been disposed of after four hours' consideration of amendments under the five minute rule when it was laid aside last week, and these comprised only the preliminary section defining the emergency for the legislation.

Republican leaders in the house decided late yesterday to make no determined effort to put through a substitute for the McNary-Haugen farm relief bill in the event the measure is defeated.

Those in charge of the McNary-Haugen measure hope to press it to a final vote before Saturday night. Informal conferences were held during the day by various members of the house and senate farm bloc in an effort to reach an agreement as to a program but apparently no action was determined upon other than to await the result of the house vote. A number of those who have been leading the fight in the house for the McNary-Haugen bill declared there were enough votes in sight to assure its passage. Among them was Representative Summers, republican, Washington, who declared in a statement that "while lacking in strength, the McNary-Haugen bill is gaining support as members come to know it better."

"We realize," said Mr. Summers, "that the fight will be a close one but there is every indication of sufficient support for favorable action if friends of the proposed legislation stand steadfast."

BURTON HUTTON ON BEAVER STAFF

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, Corvallis, May 30. (Special.)—Burton Hutton of Roseburg, sophomore in commerce, has been appointed head of the committee on publications for the 1924 Beaver. 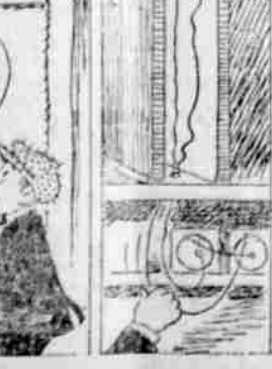
