HARRISBURG BRIDGE CONTRACT AWARDED

SALEM, May 31. — The state highway commission today announced the award of a contract to the Portland bridge company for the construction of a bridge across the Willamette river at Harrisburg. The bid was \$183,200. Ten firms submitted bids, the highest being \$237,115.

The bridge will replace the obsolete ferry that has been in operation at Harrisburg for many years, handling Pacific highway traffic. It is estimated that with the construction of the bridge 20 minutes will be saved through motor travelers between Albany and Eugene.

The new bridge will consist of three 180 foot steel spans on concrete piers and 1875 feet of timber trestle approach over the overflow section in Lane county. The contract includes river bank protection on the Harrisburg side to prevent further erosion.

Active construction will start immediately and it is believed the bridge will be open for travel early next year. The bridge will be paid for by Lane and Douglas counties and the state, each contributing a third of the cost.

At a meeting on June 12 bids will be opened by the highway commission for the new bridge across the Willamette at Albany. Keen competition for the job is looked for.

OBITUARY

Gentry Q. Sims was born at Stony Plain, Alberta, Canada, July 6th, 1896. When he was two years of age, his parents came to the United States and located in northern Idaho, where he grew to young manhood.

In October 1917, at the call of his country he volunteered, enlisting in the Bakers Corps of the 32nd division. He spent 18 months in service, of which 14 were spent overseas. In July 1919 he received his honorable discharge from the U. S. army at Camp Lewis, Washington. After which, he resided at Roseburg, Oregon, until recently, when he moved his family to Coquille, Oregon, where he was employed by Wilson and Wilson as a tree-faller.

On Thursday morning, May 22nd, he was instantly killed by a broken top of a fallen tree.

Besides his young wife and ten months old baby boy, he leaves his father and mother, Leonard J. Sims and Carrie M. Sims, of Roseburg, Oregon, six brothers and four sisters, all of whom are present except one brother, Bert L. Sims of Stony Plain, Alberta, Canada, to mourn the loss of him whom they loved.

Devoted to his wife and child, he died honorably in pursuit of their care and protection. His congenial smile and kindly spirit won for him the hearts of many friends.
