

OUR SONS AS BALL PLAYERS WAS HOPE OF MEUSEL'S DADDY

NEW YORK, June 5.—(A. P.)—Babe Ruth struck out with the full force of the dramatic eighth inning of the final game of the 1923 series at the Polo grounds, he had just created an opportunity for his father, who took advantage of it and produced the hit that sent the Yankees to the rocks on the rocks of the Polo grounds.

It hit me to all Yankee fans who must have been neutral in the series the thrill that came over in a lifetime. The neutral was Ted Meusel, the father of Emil Meusel, the Giants' pitcher, who had traveled across the continent to see his sons oppose each other in the blue ribbon event of the diamond.

During the entry of the brothers baseball, Bob who has two other brothers besides Emil, known to the fans as "Irish," said:

"They folks have asked me where the oldest brother got the nickname, it was given him in Philadelphia when he was a member of the Phillies. The bleacherites thought he was like an Irishman and told him with much loudness on many occasions. The trick label has stuck to him ever since."

"I rather wanted us all to be ball players. It was the loftiest ambition he had for his offspring. He bought home bats and balls and encouraged us to play. On Sunday afternoons he would take the four of us to the Los Angeles ball park to see the play."

"I caught the fever in 1915 when seeing the Los Angeles Irish and Irish played on the school and with other amateur clubs, and I were both pitchers in those days."

"When he went to the games on days at the Angels Park, Irish and I for Vernon and I for Los Angeles. Little did we know that in a few years we would each be on the field rooted against, and battling at each other."

"1914 Irish, who is three years senior, was picked by a scout of the Washington Americans. He did not long there and was farmed to the Amira Club of the New York League. After several years, in 1918 the Phillies got him in from Los Angeles and from there he went to the Giants in 1921."

"George Stovall, who played first base for the Vernon Club signed after I had pitched several games for the Los Angeles High School. I pitched many games for him and had fair success but Stovall, thinking of my hitting and throwing ability, converted me into a pitcher. I came to the Yankees in 1923."

At this time last year the Milk Fund heavyweight show had been staged in New York, and Jess Willard and Luis Firpo, the survivors had been matched to meet in Jersey City on July 12.

Jack Dempsey and Tommy Gibbons had been matched to meet in Shelby on July 4. Pancho Villa and Jimmy Wilde had been matched for the flyweight championship. Kilbane had lost his title to Eugene Cline, and the Frenchman had been matched with Johnny Dundee for the title. Benny Leonard had been matched with Lew Tindler for the lightweight championship, and the Harry Greb-Johnny Wilson middleweight championship was in the making.

This year the only outstanding match that has been even suggested up to this time has been the Dempsey-Willard heavyweight championship bout for September, and Dempsey had not accepted terms.

Promoters blame the slump in business on the boxers, and the promoters are held to be responsible by the boxers. Politics and petty fighting between the promoters also has discouraged the game in New York.

Tex Rickard's rivals succeeded in driving him out of New York by beating him to the prize at the two ball parks. Rickard, however, has an ace in the hole in the possession of the Jersey City stadium and in an understanding with most of the boxers that are needed to make the big matches.

Rickard, for instance, has the heavyweight situation "sawed" up through a contract with Harry Wills and first call upon the services of Jack Dempsey, Tom Gibbons and Jack Remaut. Firpo, of course, has pulled away from Rickard, but if Firpo fights he will have to fight for Rickard as he couldn't get a match with any heavyweight who is not under actual obligations to Rickard.

To get a big shot, heavyweights have to accept the opponents that promoters pick for them, but the champions not only want tremendous purses, but they want to meet opponents that will not place them in peril of losing their titles.

One of the "naturals" in prospect is a welterweight championship bout between Mickey Walker, the title holder, and Benny Leonard, the lightweight champion. So many difficulties have been encountered in the making of this match that it is probable it never will be staged.

Leonard wants \$150,000 for his spot, and he also wants a look at Walker's contract to see that the welterweight champion does not get any more than he does. Leonard, like several other champions, is not content to get all he can from the promoters, but he does not want his opponents to make any real money off him.
