KENTUCKY WOMAN TO BE APPOINTED

CLEVELAND, June 5.—Announcement of the retirement of Mrs. Harriet Taylor Upton of Warren, Ohio, as vice-chairman of the executive committee of the republican national convention was made here today by William Butler, manager of President Coolidge's pre-convention campaign.

Mrs. A. T. Hart of Louisville, widow of the late committeeman from Kentucky, will be recommended for the vice-chairmanship. She will have charge of the work among the women in the campaign.

Announcement was also made by Mr. Butler of the names of three additional delegates who will make addresses regarding the nomination of President Coolidge. They are Isaac Meekins of North Carolina, C. H. Carey of Oregon, and Representative Martin B. Elvin of Illinois.

REALTORS HEAR COOLIDGE TALK

Advises Real Estate Men to Conduct Their Businesses on Sound Basis.

COMMENDS THEIR WORK

Says They Have Made United States "The Best Buy" in the World—Favors Home Ownership.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

WASHINGTON, June 5.—The real estate men of the country were urged by president Coolidge in an address delivered today before the national association of real estate boards, to conduct their business with a view to mutuality of advantage to both buyer and seller.

"The deal in which one side gets the best of it, is not good business," the president said. "It doesn't promote more business or produce confidence in business generally. Formerly there was a curious notion that if one side in a business transaction profited, the other must necessarily lose. If that were true, all business would be under suspicion and wise people would stand aloof from it. The truth is that when two parties enter into a transaction by which each exchanges something he needs less for something he needs more, both sides are benefited. That is the ideal basis of all trade and commerce, and it is the real basis of most transactions."

"It is particularly the opportunity and duty of real estate men to maintain such a standard. As a rule their service is that of a middle-man, bringing buyer and seller together. They will in the long run prosper if they are guided by the aim to render a real service to both sides. The transaction, whose sole motive is the brokerage fee, whether or not it is earned by genuinely benefiting the principles, is not commendable."

The real estate men had gathered on the south lawn of the White House and in opening his address, the president greeted them as the "purveyors of cheer," confidence and soundly based optimism.

"You are in a very literal sense the sellers of America," he added. "You have sold it so well that it is recognized everywhere as the best buy in the world."

"Your profession has given largely to leadership of the better housing and better homes movement in this country. Therein it has done much for the advancement of the community. We can not hope that good citizens will come from bad homes. There will always be exceptions, but on the whole the quality of citizenship can not be expected to rise much above the character of the home from which the citizens come."

"The ownership of a home, the feeling of independence that comes with possessions of a bit of the earth, are among the most powerful incentives to high civic interest and usefulness. You men represent one of the strong practical forces working to make ours a nation of home owning families."
