AMERICAN FLIERS AGAIN REUNITED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
SHANGHAI, June 5.—Amer-

ica's aerial expedition around the world was re-united today. Lieutenant Lowell H. Smith, commander, whose plane, the Chicago, was delayed at Kagoshima, Japan, yesterday by engine trouble, today not only negotiated the 500 miles hop across the China sea, but did so in an hour and a quarter less time than was required by the two other planes of the air "fleet" which had preceded him.

The time made by Smith, who with his mechanic, Lieutenant Leslie P. Arnold, spent strenuous hours conquering his refractory engine in preparation for the jump, was six hours, 29 minutes.

All three planes were expected to take off for Amoy, next stop on the flight, on Saturday morning.

TWO PLANES CRASH.

SAN ANTONIO, June 5.—Today, two Kelly field airplanes and one pilot were dashed 1300 feet to the earth, mauling a body of one pilot and burying a boy in the ground as he chopped cotton.

The other pilot made a sensational parachute jump and escaped.

The dead: Lieutenant Stewart L. Thompson, student pilot, Joe Ramos, 11.

Lieutenant W. W. White, with a parachute pack on his back, stepped off into space at the high altitude, shot down from the twisted mass of wreckage and pulled the rip cord on his parachute. It opened and he floated more than a thousand feet, landing near the wreck.

DISARMAMENT MEET IS ASKED BY WOMEN

LOS ANGELES, June 5.—Mrs. Thomas G. Winters, president of the General Federation of Women Clubs, in biennial session here, announced today she would ask the convention to petition President Coolidge to call a new "international conference of world forces to further limit armament."

Outlining a tentative draft of her resolution, Mrs. Winters said that, if endorsed by the federation, the president of the United States would be asked to urge on the world power further limitation of new and extreme methods of warfare, such as the use of deadly gases.

The resolution also will contain a clause requesting the chief executive of the United States to bring before the proposed international conference a suggestion for the codification of international law.

DEMOCRATS FACING KU KLUX QUESTION

INDIANAPOLIS, June 5.—A declaration concerning the Ku Klux Klan and a stubborn fight between seven aspirants for the gubernatorial nomination were among a long list of troublesome party problems sent to the floor of the democratic state convention today for settlement.

Contests of less ominous proportions over minor state offices, with the opposing elements generally the Klan forces, were viewed as additional prospective fire point of the session.
