The Roseburg chamber of commerce will hold a series of joint meetings in the various towns of the county next week. Jake Allen, Organization Councilor of the Oregon Chamber of Commerce, will arrive in the city Monday morning and will assist the local chamber in all the meetings. These meetings are to be held for the purpose of furthering the idea of a county chamber of commerce. At the present time there is a county unit of the land settlement department of the State Chamber of Commerce in Douglas county, and owing to the amount of work that the county unit already has done, it is felt that an even closer relation between the various communities of the county would be of untold benefit to the county as a whole. Following is the schedule of the meetings for next week:

Monday evening, June 9, at 6:30—Dinner meeting at Glendale, with Canyonville business men as guests.

Tuesday evening, June 10, at 6:30—Dinner meeting at Myrtle Creek, with Riddle business men as guests.

Wednesday evening, June 11th, at 6:30—Dinner meeting at Oakland, with Sutherlin business men as guests.

Thursday evening, June 12, at 6:30—Dinner meeting at Drain, with Yoncalla business men as guests.

Friday noon, June 13, at 12 o'clock—Luncheon meeting with business men of Elkton.

Friday evening, June 13, 6:30—Dinner meeting at Reedsport, with Gardiner business men as guests.

Mr. Allen will make a short address before the Kiwanis Club at their weekly luncheon Tuesday noon in this city, and also will speak to the Rotary Club at their luncheon Thursday noon.

to attend any of the meetings will confer a great favor if they will notify the chamber of commerce so that reservations can be made for them at the dinners. This will help the local organizations to plan on how many plates to provide. It is hoped that at least five business and professional men will attend each dinner scheduled for next week. It will be remembered that at the membership meeting held in the Armory on May 6th, that the local chamber went on record as favoring the county chamber of commerce, so it is really up to our people to show that they mean it. It cannot be expected that secretary Will E. Holbein should properly represent the business interests of this city alone.

There are many things that a county chamber of commerce can do at this particular time. Owing to the reputation that Douglas county has at the present time it is necessary that a much more closer relation be established between the towns of the county so as to protect the communities against those who wish to work petty schemes to secure money from the communities and with a compact organization like the one proposed all this can be looked after. Furthermore, it is absolutely necessary for this county to get out some advertising matter setting forth the advantages of the county and as no appropriation was made by the county court for advertising this year the different towns will have to provide it. Sure it is that one town alone cannot do this, but it will take the united effort of all the towns to get out the proper literature.

There are many other ways that the county chamber of commerce can function to the advantage of all concerned.

MEDFORD AUTO

RACES JUNE 19-20

MEDFORD, June 6.—The annual big automobile race classic of the northwest will be held at the Jackson county speedway near Medford on June 19 and 20. There will be five feature events each day, three of which will be contests of speed in which the fastest race cars of the northwest will be driven by drivers known for their daring performances in former events.

Southern Oregon and northern Cal-

ifornia drivers will enter eleven cars and the balance of the twenty race cars come from Eugene, Portland and Seattle. The mile and an eighth speed way, with its super-elevations is the fastest dirt track on the coast and will be in perfect condition for the meet.

There will be two events that will be different from any other ever witnessed on this speedway. One will be a back-up race of ordinary cars and the other will be a relay race where each participant will use three touring cars. The driver will use each one of the cars for a third of the distance on each lap and there will be three laps to the race. In this event no self starters will be permitted and the drivers will be compelled to crank their cars at each change. A good purse is being offered for each of these two events and they are open to all who might wish to test their speed. The different communities are invited to have their locality represented with an entrant in the relay and back-up races.
