The California boys are no longer in the oil game is demonstrated by the fact that the same company which has been attempting to put a well north of town with a drill, is now busily engaged in preparing arrangements for a well to be put down on the place, about a mile west of town.

L. Mallernee and L. W. Borboth expert drillers and financiers in the enterprise, seen here for some time and of constructing the derrick is well under way. A standard equipment, capable of going to a depth of 5000 feet, will be used in drilling this well, and Mr. Mallernee stated Wednesday that it is expected to be ready to "spud" about July 4th. GUARD COMPANY LEAVES MONDAY

Company D Receives Final Orders for Entrainment to Camp Lewis.

TROOP IS WELL FILLED

Enlistment Is Close to Maximum as Result of Many Recruits Taken in During Past Months.

Company D, 162nd Infantry, the local unit of the Oregon National Guard, has received its final orders for departure to Camp Lewis for a two weeks' training in camp. The company is to board its train on Monday, June 9, the train to leave at 11:50 at night.

Troop train number three, which carries the local unit will arrive at Portland on the morning of June 10th and at Camp Lewis at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day. The train also carries Company A, 186th Infantry, of Medford; Company D, 186th Infantry, of Cottage Grove; Company F, 162nd Infantry, of Salem; Medical Detachment 186th Infantry, of Eugene; and Hospital company number 167, of Lebanon.

The program for camp activities this year has been so arranged as to give the men more time for recreation than they have heretofore received. Special features of entertainment have been arranged to extend throughout the entire encampment, which will include trips to nearby towns, boat excursions, swimming parties and a general good time outside of regular training hours. The course also includes an intensive training schedule prepared to develop every side of military life.

6:45 a. m. Reveille—10 minutes setting up exercises.

8:30 to 11:30 a. m.—Field work.

3 p. m. to 4 p. m.—Supervised athletics.
4:45 p. m.—Guard mount.
5:15 p. m.—Ceremonies by battalion or regiment.

Saturday morning 8 a. m.—Company inspection.
9:30 a. m.—Battalion inspection.
Sunday morning 10 a. m.—Church services.

The maximum enlistment has almost been reached with many new recruits having come in during the past few months. The company platoon will again enter the contest for state championship and will make every effort to retain the title which they won last year.
