

JAP CABINET QUITS AT LAST

devastated by last September's earthquake and the crushing defeat it received at the polls recently, since which its retirement has been regarded almost as an accomplished fact.

The anticipation in all quarters is that Viscount Takasaki Kato, for the last eight years one of the most notable candidates for the prime ministry, will succeed Viscount Kiyoura. He is head of the Kenseikai, which now musters the greatest strength of any party in the lower house of the diet and the genro, or elder statesmen, have placed the seal of their approval on his appointment.

His attitude toward the United States never has been very clearly defined, but it is known that he represented the part played by the Washington conference in abrogation of the Anglo-Japanese alliance. Speaking recently of American immigration legislation, he used the phrases

"unfairness" and "prejudice against the Japanese."

One thing seems fairly certain — his summons to office will increase the impression that a bureaucratic administration has been overthrown by popular vote.

While the outstanding reason for the cabinet's resignation is the defeat of its supporting parties in the elections, it is understood, Premier Kiyoura also accepted responsibility for a "diplomatic blunder" in connection with exclusion of Japanese immigrants from the United States.

Almost at the same time the regents command was delivered to Premier Kiyoura, an imperial messenger left for Kyoto, presumably to consult Prince Saloni, one of the most prominent statesmen, whose opinion always is sought before a new government is formed.

Marquis Matsukata, the other of the older statesmen, already was in Tokyo tonight. Prince Saloni has been detained in Kyoto by his illness. Premier Kiyoura was reticent when he discussed his resignation with newspaper men tonight.

"The reasons for the resignation are obvious and do not need any

explanation," he insisted. As a defense in part of his cabinet and his apparent lack of constructive government, Kiyoura later issued a statement in the form of a classical Japanese poem.

"Though I have rendered no distinguished services to the throne," read the statement, "I am glad that I have not committed any serious blunders. I hope that we can remain free from passion."

The refusal of the prince regent to accept the cabinet's resignation at once was in keeping with Japanese government traditions, custom prescribing that such resignations never should be accepted until the successor is named.

as truthful, decent, upright, law abiding citizens, conscious of their duties and responsibilities to the community in which they live.

"Only such defense as that to which every human being is entitled will be provided for their sons. Assuming that the facts in this case are substantially as published, then the only proceeding they favor is a simple, solemn investigation under the law, touching the mental responsibility of their accused sons."

"They emphatically state that no counsel for the accused boys will be retained, other than those lawyers now representing them, with the possible but not probable retention of one additional local lawyer. There will be no large sums of money spent, either for legal or medical talent."

"If the accused boys are found by a jury to be not mentally responsible, their families in accordance with their conscious duty towards the community agree that the public must be fully protected from any further menace by these boys."

"In no event will the families of the accused boys use money in any attempt to defeat justice."

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, June 7. — A letter purporting to have been written by Curt Gelsler of Milwaukee, Wis., offering to substitute himself on the

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gallows for Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, confessed kidnapers and slayers of Robert Franks if his heirs were given \$1,000,000, was received by Morgan Collins, superintendent of police today. It read: "If this can be legally arranged and the parents of one of the boys are willing to pay to my heirs \$1,000,000, then I am ready to be hung any time the law is ready to call me, as there is no glory in life ahead of me."

"I am a tailor, 25 years old, well, strong, honest and a good citizen. I have worked since I was 12 years of age and never harmed no one. The only crime I ever committed was working hard all my life."

Substitution on the gallows or in prison is not permitted by the American laws.

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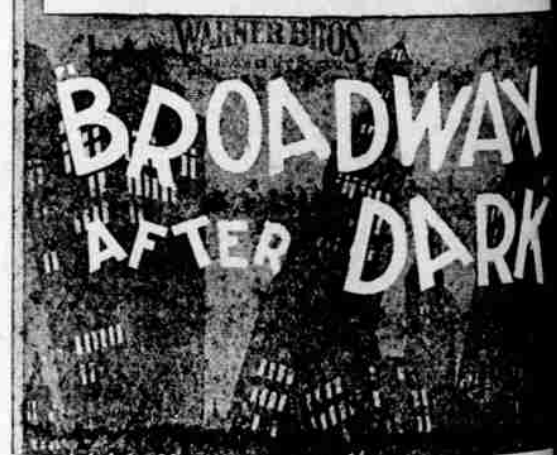
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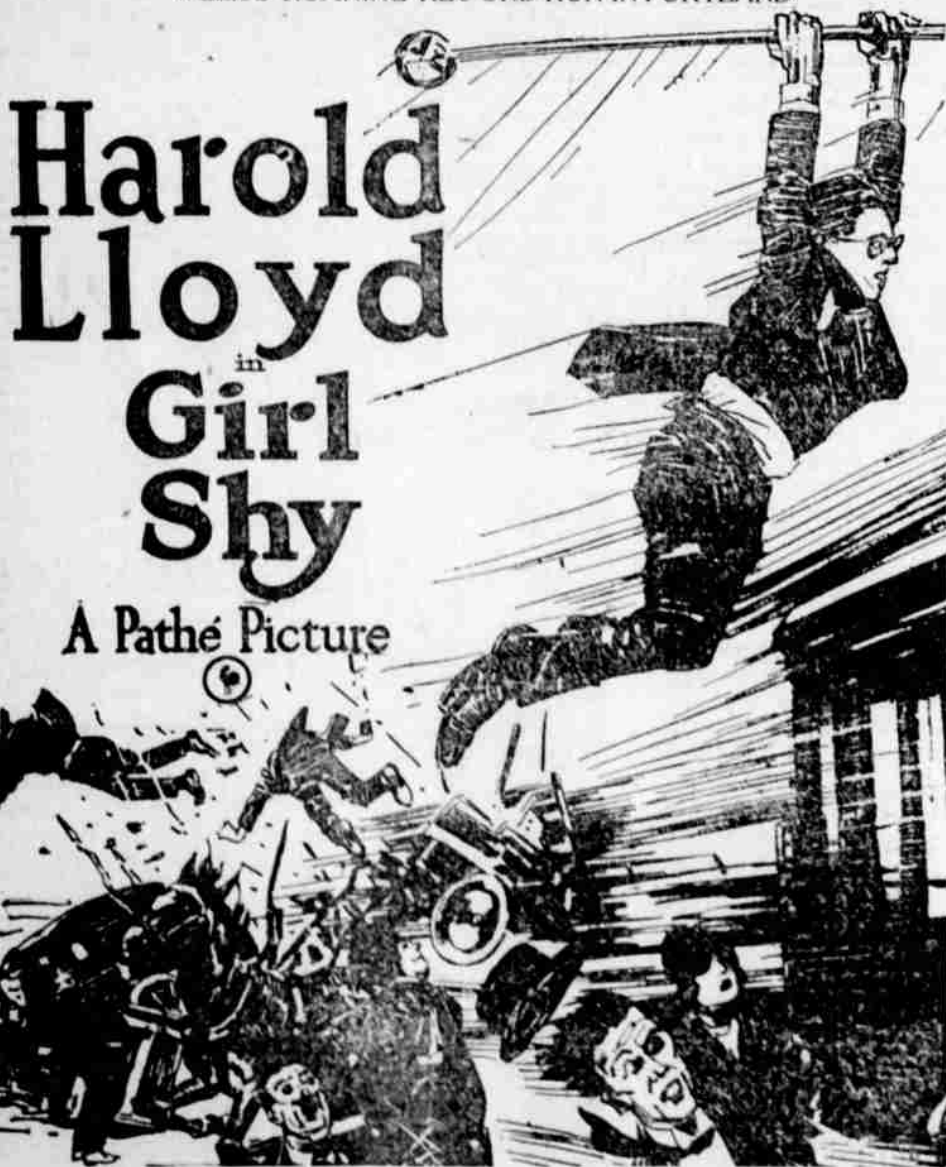
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
