C. stadium, Long Island City, last night.
Wills' victory was as clean as a point verdict could be, but the game Irishman took all that his massive negro opponent could send.
Madden fought a purely defensive fight. He was loudly cheered for his gameness.

BORAH NOT IN RACE

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, June 10.—Senator Borah of Idaho sent instructions to Cleveland today that his name be withdrawn if it were presented to the republican national convention as a vice presidential candidate. He urged former Senator William S. Kenyon of Iowa for the nomination and it was said he had recommended him at a conference with President Coolidge.
Senator Borah communicated his wish in a telegram to John W. Hart, national committeeman for Idaho.
"If my name is presented to the convention," the telegram said, "please ask delegation to promptly withdraw same and positively decline for me. Make no mistake about this."

WILLAMETTE PRES. RESIGNS.

SALEM, June 10.—A resignation asking for full release from his position was presented to the board of trustees of Willamette University by President Carl Gregg Doney, when the board met here in its annual session this morning. The matter was deferred until shortly before the noon hour and after only a very brief discussion of it the board adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon when the resignation will come up again and final action will be taken.

The formal resignation came as a complete surprise after the announcement yesterday that the president would only request that his duties be lightened by the appointment of an assistant. It has been known here for several months that Doney was laboring under a burden from which he must sooner or later seek relief because of recent poor health and this was assigned as the basis of the request.

Members of the board declined to discuss the matter until action had been taken this afternoon. Rumors are that if the resignation is accepted, Dr. W. W. Younson of Portland, will be a likely candidate.
