NEW FORMULA CURES MANY CANCER CASES

(Associated Press Lensed Wire.)
CHICAGO, June 11.—Announcement that a new chemical formula had cured 40 per cent out of 300 cases of cancer was made today by Dr. C. Everett Field, of the Radium Institute of New York, before the association for the study and cure of cancer, meeting with the American Medical Association convention.
The formula, Dr. Field said, was based on the theory that cancer is a germ disease. The formula, he said, had been worked out because the X-ray and radium and other previously known forms of treatment were inadequate.
