BOLING HELD ON FORGERY CHARGE

Accused of Forging Endorsement to Check Given Canyonville Garage.

HELD FOR GRAND JURY

Government May Investigate Case to Determine Whether or Not Check Was Stolen from Mail Box.

Joe Boling who occupied a cell in the county jail several weeks before the last grand jury session, is back again being held for another investigation, this time on a charge of issuing a forged check.

Boling first came before the court when he was arrested on a charge of attempting to kill L. P. Rapp of Oakland. It appears that he and his wife had been having domestic trouble and Boling went to Rapp's farm where the woman was employed and caused a disturbance. Rapp, interfered and Boling threatened him with a rifle, which fortunately was empty. The grand jury investigating the case found that the evidence was not sufficient to warrant a trial and returned a not true bill. Boling was released and has been working around the county since that time.

The crime with which he is now charged is alleged to have occurred during the month of January, when it is claimed he passed a check with a forged endorsement on Elton Bollenbaugh of Canyonville. The check was drawn by the Western Meat Company in favor of John Bidness of Canyonville, and had Mr. Bidness' forged endorsement and below that the name of John Baldwin, a name which Boling admits he has used frequently.

Boling passed the check on Bollenbaugh in return for some garage work done at the Canyonville garage of which Bollenbaugh is the proprietor. The check in the sum of \$17.16 was honored by the banks, but later was found to have a forged endorsement and so repayment of the amount was demanded and made.

On Wednesday Boling is alleged to have made further threats against his wife and started for Perdue where she was employed. Sheriff Starmer heard of the threats spoken by Boling and instructed his deputy, Jay Wright, to arrest Boling and bring him to Roseburg. Boling was arrested and on the way in a stop was made at the Canyonville garage. Bollenbaugh recognized Boling as the man who passed the check in January and came on into Roseburg and swore out a complaint.

A preliminary examination was given and Boling bound over to the grand jury under \$500 bonds, and being unable to furnish the amount was lodged in jail.

Boling admits passing the check, according to the officers, and also admits that the name Joe Baldwin was signed by him. He says he was driving back from Grants Pass and had reached a point where the road turns off to Glendale when he met a man who employed him to cut some wood. He was paid \$3 for cutting a tier and a half of the wood, he claims. The man tendered the check made out in favor of Bidness. Boling says he had some large bills but was unable to make change so they drove into Glendale where Boling changed one of his bills and made change for the check. He went on into Canyonville and had the work done and tendered

the check in payment. John Bidness believes the check was stolen from his mail box which is situated along the highway. It is very probable that the government will make an investigation of the case and if there is evidence that Boling robbed the mail box the government will probably take over the case.

LA FOLLETTE SAYS FARMER IS BILKED

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) MADISON, Wis., June 13.—The present national administration has "literally turned its back upon the farmer," Senator Robert La Follette of Wisconsin declared in a statement made public today. He further declared that the responsibility for the failure of the 68th congress to meet a righteous demand from the farmers for necessary and effective legislation will rest upon President Coolidge.

His statement in part follows: "The sixty eighth congress has adjourned after voting down a resolution providing that the house and senate should reassemble after the national conventions in order to give immediate consideration to measures providing for relief of agriculture. "Those interests which demand ship subsidies, tax reduction for profiteers, railroad guarantees, fat oil and land grabs and other special privilege legislation, make the argument that the farmer must pull himself out of his difficulties by his bootstraps and that nothing which the federal government can do by law would prove of the slightest assistance. This, in substance, is precisely the argument addressed to congress by President Coolidge in his first message."

LT. LOWELL SMITH IS FORCED TO LAND

(Associated Press Leased Wire.) HONGKONG, June 13.—Lieutenant Lowell H. Smith, commander of the American army around the world flight, with his mechanic, Lieutenant Leslie P. Arnold, was forced to land between Hue, capital of Annam, French Indo-China and Touraine, a port of Annam, according to a cable received here.

Lieutenant Smith has requested that a new motor be sent him at once from Saigon. Smith, with his companions, Lieutenant Leigh Wade, with Sergeant Henry H. Ogden, as mechanic, and Lieutenant Eric Nelson, with Lieutenant John Harding, Jr., assisting him, left Haiphong at 10 o'clock on the morning of June 11. Wade and Nelson arrived safely that afternoon at Touraine, but Smith was forced down. Communication was established with him by automobile.
