together in unified fellowship at pre-
cisely the same time.

RED LITERATURE SOUGHT IN ASTORIA

Astoria, June 14. — Authorities
here are investigating reports that
a large quantity of bolshevik litera-
ture of inflammable nature has been
landed here from a steamer from
Siberia. The literature advocating
communist doctrine was printed in
Finnish, Swedish and Norwegian
languages, and was admitted before
its nature was understood, accord-
ing to reports published in newspa-
pers here.

TENNESSEE IS HIT BY CLOUDBURSTS

(Continued from page 1.)

could be reached by telephone
said that 16 were known to be
dead as a result of the cloud-
burst which apparently centered
in and east of Cardens
Bluff.

Names of nine persons were
given.

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., June 14. —
Terrific cloudbursts in the mountains
near Johnson City, early today, caused
heavy loss of life and large prop-
erty damage, according to meager
telephone messages received here.
Twelve are known to be dead at Car-
den and one at Stony Creek.

All communication lines are down to
Carden and Hampton, Tenn., which
appeared to be in the storm area.
Concrete bridges were tossed aside
in the highways and the Appalachian
division of the Southern Railway is
reported badly damaged between
Fish Springs and Mountain City,
Tenn. This division runs from Bris-
tol, Tenn., through Elizabethtown and
Butler to Mountain City.

The stricken area is partly traversed
by two branch line railways, both
of which are badly damaged and by-
highways which were not the best in
dry weather and now no longer exist.
Relief parties were unable to pene-
trate farther than the edge of the
storm area except on foot.

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., June 14. —
At least 22 persons are dead and
probably many more in a terrific
cloudburst that early today wiped out
the towns of Carden and Hunter,
near here. Incomplete telephone re-
ports from nearby points said the
two towns had been wiped out. Roads
have been washed out and it is im-
possible to approach the vicinity, it
is said.

The known dead, according to
telephone reports here, state that 12
are dead at Carden and at least 10
at Hunter.

The first calls were for aid and
within an hour afterward efforts were
being made to reach the scene by
relief workers. Several bodies are re-
ported to have been recovered.

ATLANTA, Ga., June 14. — Upon re-
ceipt of a news dispatch that the
towns of Hunter and Carden, Tenn.,
had been virtually destroyed by a
cloudburst early today, southern di-
vision headquarters of the American
Red Cross here announced they had
despatched a staff representative to
the affected territory to take charge
of relief measures.

TOMMY MILTON TAKES LEAD IN LONG RACE

SPEEDWAY, Altoona, Pa., June
14. — Jimmy Murphy the 1922
speed king, won the 250 mile auto
race on the Altoona track this af-
ternoon. Fred Comer was second
and Antoine Mourre third.

SPEEDWAY, ALTOONA, Pa.,
June 14. — Tommy Milton jumped
into the lead early in the 250 mile
auto race here this afternoon. Af-
ter thirty miles of terrific driving,
Milton was out in front, holding a
slight lead over Harry Hartz and
Wardie Anstenberg.

Hartz jumped into the lead at the
60 mile mark, when Milton went to
the pits to change a tire. Milton
made up the lost time in short or-
der and took the lead when the
drivers had covered 100 miles. An-
toine Mourre was second and Jimmy
Murphy third.

Rain began falling at 123 miles.
Murphy shot into first place at 124
miles.
At 185 mile mark, Murphy was
holding the lead with Comer sec-
ond and Mourre third with only two
laps of a second separating the
three cars.

SPEEDWAY, Altoona, Pa., June
14. — Jerry Wunderlich was fatally
injured here today while taking
part in the 250 mile auto race. He
was forced out on the back stretch
at the 200 mile mark when some-
thing went wrong with his motor.

ILLINOIS MAN IS A RACE SENSATION

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)
HARVARD STADIUM, CAM-
BRIDGE, Mass., June 14. — P. P.
Johnson, Illinois A. C. star, sprang
a sensational performance in the
finals of the 110 meter hurdles to-
day when he raced over the sticks
in 14 8-10 seconds, tying the best
world's record set by Earl Thomp-
son of Canada, in the 1920 olympics.

Johnson's performance was all
the more remarkable because it was
made over a wet track in the face
of a pelting rain.

Chester Bowman, fleet Syracuse
star won the 100 meter Olympic fi-
nal trial today. Charley Paddock, the
California ace, and Johnson Scholz
of New York, yesterday's sprint sen-
sation, were deadlocked for second
place. Bowman equalled the Olympi-
c record time of 10 6-10 seconds.

Bowman's victory was gained in
a spectacular struggle, the finish of
which saw the leading four separat-
ed by less than two yards. Scholz
showed the way for the first 75
yards, but Bowman and Paddock
closed with a terrific rush, the
former breasting the tape in front
of the Olympic champion by the
width of his chest.

Frank Hussey, New York school
boy, finished with a spurt that
gained him fourth place over such
stars as Murchison, national cham-
pion, and Al. Leconey of Philadel-
phia, thus virtually assuring the
youngster a place on the Olympic
team.

HARVARD STADIUM, CAM-
BRIDGE, Mass., June 14. — Jack-
son Scholz, New York A. C. veteran,
smashed the world's 200 meter dash
record for the second time in two
days when he won his semi-final
heat today in the Olympic trials in
the spectacular time of 20 8-10 sec-
onds, one tenth of a second faster
than the figure he set in yesterday's
trial.

Charley Paddock won the second
semi-final in 21 2-10 seconds —
nosing out George Hill of Pennsyl-
vania, with Norton of Yale, third,
two yards back.

The 800 meter final resulted in
several startling upsets and an un-
expected victory for Richardson of
Leland Stanford, who won by three
yards in a driving finish, from
Schuyler Enck of Penn state. Ray
Dodge of Oregon Angles took third
place and Ray Watson of Illinois
A. C., fourth after "Soapy" Waters.
Harvard A. C. fell six yards from
the finish.

Charley Paddock, it was said,
pulled up lame after running his
200 meter semi-final and withdrew
from the finals on instructions from
Lawson Robertson, head olympic
track coach. The coast flier already
was assured of his place on the
team as a result of his 100 meter
performance and Robertson decided
not to take further chances with the
star's condition.

Pole vault: L. E. Barnes, Holly-
wood; James K. Brooker, Michikan,
Ralph Spawrow, Oregon, and George
Graham, California Technical, tied
at 13 feet.
