TRUCKFUL OF DRUGS SEIZED BY OFFICERS

NEW YORK, June 15. — Drugs valued at more than \$2,000,000 were seized Saturday on a truck coming off a pier at Hoboken, N. J. It became known today, H. D. Esterbrook, chief of the special agents of the treasury department who conducted the raid, said the seizure uncovered one of the most elaborate and effective schemes ever divulged for smuggling narcotics into the United States.

AFTER MOTORISTS.

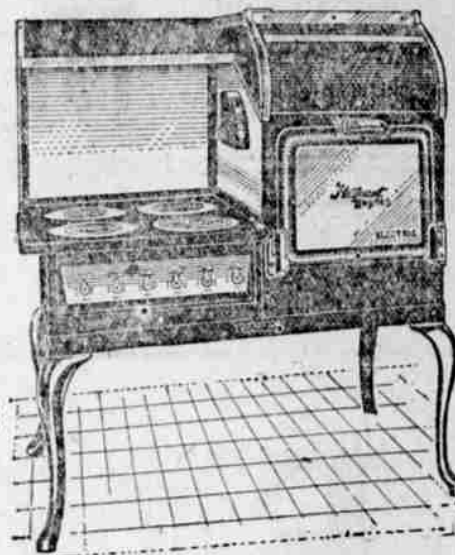

REV. HILTON TO QUIT PASTORATE

Resigns Position Here and
Will Leave Soon for
Southern California.

ACTION IS SURPRISE

Resignation and Request for
Immediate Release Come
as Complete Surprise
to Congregation.

Rev. C. H. Hilton, for the past seven years the pastor of the Roseburg Christian church, yesterday tendered his resignation and is leaving the latter part of next month for Burbank, Cal., having accepted the pastorate of the large church there. A chronic affliction from hay fever, which threatens to run into asthma is the chief cause for the change, Rev. Hilton believing that a change of climate will prove beneficial.

The resignation at yesterday morning's service came as a complete surprise and shock to the congregation, which in releasing Rev. Hilton from his work here expressed great regret over his departure.

He will represent the local church at the state convention in Turner July 5 to 12, where he will serve in an official capacity as a member of the state board, and then at his own request will be released in time to attend the California state convention which starts in Long Beach on July 25.

During the time that Rev. Hilton has been serving as local pastor, the Christian church has been making rapid forward strides. This is particularly true in a missionary way,

for in addition to unusually large offerings for all of the usual missionary boards and activities, the local church for several years aided in the support of the minister at Astoria, where the church was too small to employ a pastor without assistance. For the past two years the church has contributed several hundred dollars for the support of Rev. J. T. Stivers, state missionary, who has also maintained a native evangelist in Africa, and has done other special missionary work. Locally in addition to paying off all existing indebtedness, and operating the church on a cash basis, the congregation has raised over \$10,000 on a building fund, and hopes within a few years to be housed in a new structure.

Under the leadership of Rev. Hilton, the congregation has steadily increased in size and strength until it is one of the largest and strongest in the city. All departments are well organized and operating in a very efficient manner.

Rev. Hilton has not only made himself a power in the church, but has been a factor in community life. During the war he was in constant demand as a speaker and upon all occasions responded with a readiness which won him considerable recognition as an extemporaneous orator. He is a man of commanding personality and a speaker of more than ordinary ability, and his place in the community has been such that a great number of people in this vicinity regret his departure.

ATHLETES TO OLYMPICS.

NEW YORK, June 15. — The elite of America's athletic prowess and heroines, 254 strong, are sailing from Hoboken on the specially chartered steamer America today at noon, standard time, to compete for the 1924 Olympic laurels in France next month. Track and field stars comprise 195 of the total aggregation, which will wear the Yankee colors in eight branches of competition. Supplementing the track team will be 11 gymnasts, 26 boxers, 17 wrestlers, 26 men and 24 women swimmers, seven cyclists, 17 fencers and 19 crammers.

This main body of athletes will be followed next Saturday on the liner Homeric by the Yale eight, which won the right to represent the United States in the Olympics by a thrilling victory in the final

trials at Philadelphia last Saturday.

MAINE VOTING TODAY.

PORTLAND, Me., June 16. — Maine voters went to the polls today to nominate republican and democratic candidates for governor, senators, state officers and members of the legislature. Senator Fernald, republican, was opposed for re-nomination for former congressman Frank E. Guernsey and Louis A. Jack.

Fulton J. Redman was unopposed for the democratic nomination for senator.

Frank J. Farrington and Ralph O. Brewster were the candidates for the republican nomination for governor with William Pattangall unopposed for the democratic nomination. The Ku Klux Klan during the campaign announced its support of Brewster, who has sponsored a proposed amendment to the state constitution forbidding the use of state funds for sectarian high schools.

MINNESOTA VOTES AT POLLS.

ST. PAUL, June 16. — Five contests involving 31 candidates held first interest as the voters of Minnesota went to the polls today to nominate party candidates in a state-wide primary election.

The contests were for the republican senatorial nomination, farmer-labor and republican gubernatorial and associate and chief justice of the state supreme court. For the farmer-labor senatorial nomination supporters of Senator Magnus Johnson predicted his nomination.

Three candidates sought the republican gubernatorial nomination — Oscar Hallam, St. Paul, former supreme court justice; Ole Sagvick, Duluth, state senator and Thomas H. Schall, now congressman from the tenth district.

Gubernatorial candidates were plentiful, six seeking the republican nomination and seven the farmer-labor endorsement. An absence of clear cut issues made the outcome doubtful.

The democratic ticket shows no opposition for state officials.
