SOUTH DAKOTA IS SWEEPED BY STORMS

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

MITCHELL, S. D., June 16.—Additional details were expected today from sections of South Dakota swept by tornadoes, wind, and hail storms, Saturday night.

Advices received here by officials of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railway told of a family of eight being killed at Bijou Hills, Brule county. Two others met death at White Lake in Aurora county, another at Pierre and one at Blunt.

Glad Valley, a small town in Ziebach county, was said to have been virtually wiped out in the storm, which covered a territory of approximately 50 miles and swept over nine counties. Twenty persons were injured at Glad Valley, three seriously, and property damage was high. Four persons here were injured, one probably fatally. Many houses and barns were unroofed, or blown down. Livestock suffered heavily and the poultry was blown away. Hundreds of light, power, telephone and telegraph poles were blown down. In the neighborhood of Murdo and Chamberlain, two inches of rain fell in 10 minutes.

Huron reported 2.20 inches of rain in 20 minutes. The downpour was responsible for irrigation dams being swept away near Draper.

ANIMAL CRUELTY IS BOOED BY ENGLISH

LONDON, June 16.—The opening of Tex Austin's international rodeo in the British Empire exhibition stadium, when one of the steers suffered a broken leg while being roped and tied by an American cowboy, was followed today by an appeal to Premier MacDonald by the Society for Prevention of cruelty to animals "in the name of humanity" to forbid the steer roping and wrestling contests.

After the accident to the steer on Saturday which brought scattering bores" and cries of "shame" from the crowd of 40,000 persons, Austin and his cowboys decided to exclude the roping contests. It was announced, however, that as the cowboys had traveled 5,000 miles to England to compete for money prizes, the roping and tying contests would be continued in the stadium at hours when no audience was present.
