## COUNTY UNITED ON BOOSTER PLAN

Meetings Held During Past Week Smooth Difficulties and Foster Harmony.

## SCENERY IS PRAISED

Road Down Umpqua One of Most Scenic Rides in the Entire Northwest—Development Certain.

"We surely had a strenuous but interesting week of it," said Will E. Holbein Saturday afternoon upon his return from Reedsport, where with Mr. Jake Allen of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, he took part in the last joint meeting of the various towns of the county on Friday evening. "The Reedsport meeting was attended by more people than any other meeting in the county, the ladies being invited to the dinner, and the Gardiner Chamber of Commerce had a number of representatives at the meeting also," said Mr. Holbein.

The directors of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce have reason to feel pretty good over the reception that was accorded Messrs. Allen and Holbein in the various towns of the county last week. Starting at Glendale Monday evening, these gentlemen succeeded in organizing a local Chamber of Commerce that is already functioning.

On Tuesday evening a number of our local business men accompanied Messrs. Allen and Holbein to Myrtle Creek, where the business men of Riddle were guests of the Myrtle Creek Commercial Club. This meeting was more than successful in every way.

Wednesday evening a meeting was held at Oakland with the Sutherlin business men as guests. Several business men from this city also attended this meeting. A thorough understanding was reached at Oakland as to the functions of the State Chamber of Commerce and the proposed Douglas County Chamber of Commerce.

Thursday evening a joint meeting of the Chambers of Commerce of Drain, Yoncalla, and Elkton was held at Drain, the meeting being addressed by Messrs. Allen and Holbein. This meeting was an exceptionally good one, and it was pleasant to see how the business men of the three towns got together in the round table discussion and talked over matters of benefit to the entire county.

But as stated the meeting of the Reedsport and Gardiner Chambers of Commerce at Reedsport Friday evening, was the largest held in the county, and was therefore perhaps the most enthusiastic. Before the close of the meeting a motion was made and carried that the two Chambers of Commerce in the western part of the county combine for their mutual benefit. This was a long step forward, and guarantees further progress in that part of Douglas County.

Mr. Holbein reports that the work on the new road from Scottsburg to Reedsport is progressing satisfactorily but that it will be necessary for a bridge to be built over Mill Creek, a short distance out of Scottsburg, before the road will be ready for vehicles. Only one short stretch of heavy rock work remains to be done. It is said that this road runs through more picturesque scenery than even the far famed Kootenai River in northwestern Montana. It is safe to say that with the opening of this new highway Reedsport and Gardiner will see more people than they ever dreamed of before. It is certain that all lovers of nature will advise all tourists to take this side trip through the western part of Douglas County.

"The business men of this county are alive to the boundless resources we have here, and are a unit in the desire to make progress in all lines of endeavors from now on. Never before have they all been of one mind on the important things that will make Douglas County more prosperous and popular as a place of residence. Great things are coming to pass in this county in the next few years just because some of the unwarranted suspicion as between towns and business men is being overcome," says Secretary Holbein.

Mr. Allen's visit to this county has done more to overcome the feeling that Portland is trying to put it over the rest of the state in a business way, than anything else that has happened in years. When it is remembered that the business men of Portland raised over \$300,000 for the development of the state through several departments of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce it will be seen that there is a real effort being made to live down old prejudices and show the people of the state that the largest city of Oregon is willing to put up money to develop all parts of the state regardless of the benefit that might accrue to Portland. The Oregon State Chamber of Commerce as now functioning and with the splendid men at the head of it is bound to bring to the state thousands of satisfied settlers, who will do their part to make Oregon a greater and more progressive state. The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is under lasting obligations to the State Chamber of Commerce for the many things that it has done for Douglas County this year.

## NAVAL DISASTER IS BEING PROBED

(Associated Press Leased Wire) SAN PEDRO, June 16.—The naval board investigating the Mississippi explosion Thursday in which 48 lives were lost, re-convened today aboard the battleship Tennessee with naval men and observers.

Eighteen witnesses are on the list today and with investigation at present centering on three probable reasons for the explosion as brought out in the earlier testimony.

First—Low air pressure in the apparatus designed to clean the gun barrel after each charge and the possibility of a burning fragment left in the barrel igniting the fatal charge.

Second—the possibility of a linen tag on one of the silk T. N. T. containers having been left on the bag, with the result that it may have been the fuse that ignited the new charge.

Third—A defect in the mechanism other than low air pressure, which made it slow in response to the calls of the crew.

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Meanwhile American newspapers were requested as a patriotic duty not to attempt to forecast the contents of the reply.

The communication will be translated into code and communicated at once to his government.

SAN PEDRO, June 16.—Number 2 turret on the U. S. S. Mississippi where the explosion, fatal to 48 naval men, occurred Thursday, was not the only one in which the auxiliary gun mechanism was not working properly that day, according to testimony at the inquiry aboard the U. S. S. Tennessee today.

Saturday the investigators heard that the air pressure for cleaning the barrels and closing the breeches of number two turret guns was so low that the breeches had to be closed by hand.

Today Walter C. Ebel, turret captain first class, of turret number 3, testified that in his turret the air pressure for his guns had been insufficient throughout the entire firing practice in which the ship was engaged when the explosion occurred in No. 2 turret. Ebel said: "Just before commencement of firing I noticed 120 pounds of pressure on our indicator in number 3 turret, which should have registered 150 pounds. I called the air compressor room and asked for 150 pounds, but after the second salvo it continued to decrease until at the end of the twelfth salvo it showed only 110 pounds."

Among the witnesses expected to give evidence this afternoon, are Ensign H. D. Smith of Spokane, who led the rescue work after the explosion, and three survivors of the crew in the fatal turret, J. L. Morgentern, J. F. Caviezel and R. A. McKevin.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 16.—The hand of a dead man whose body was being removed from turret number 2 aboard the U. S. S. Mississippi late Thursday afternoon last, touched the selective switch in the death chamber, and fired the left 14-inch rifle, injuring four men by its recoil. It was established today by the naval court of inquiry in session aboard the U. S. S. Mississippi.

## TWO ARRESTED ON BOOZE SALE CHARGE

Walter Anderson and Harley Adkins were arrested yesterday at Reedsport charged with the sale of liquor. A warrant has been issued for a third man but he has left Reedsport and has not yet been arrested. The arrests were made by deputy sheriffs, who have been secretly at work in Reedsport for several days. A few days ago two Reedsport men became suspicious of one of the deputies and after agreeing to sell him some liquor, took him out a short distance from Reedsport and then forced him to submit to a most thorough search. They failed, however, to find his credentials which were cleverly hidden upon his person, and when he feigned intense anger they were quite profuse in their apologies, and procured two pints of liquor for him, according to Sheriff Starmer. Anderson who operates the power boat Gasco between Gardiner and Reedsport, gave bail in the sum of \$500. Adkins is in jail at Reedsport. They will be brought to Roseburg for trial.
