HEALTH SURVEY IS INTERESTING

interesting facts, one of which is that there is a marked thyroid (goitre) belt around Myrtle Creek, possibly extending as far north as Roseburg. In Myrtle Creek out of 127 school children examined 15 were found to have enlarged thyroid glands. At Green out of 56 children 10 were in a similar condition. Whether or not this condition is local in the two communities or extends in the form of a belt between the two places remains to be seen, and an examination of the schools at Dillard and points between the two larger schools will possibly determine this fact. This condition is possibly due to the water supply or to some lack of proper elements in

the soil and an effort will be made to determine and correct the source of this trouble.

There are a great many underweight children in the county, the report shows, a condition which is considered quite unusual for a county with such excellent climate as may be found here. The county average for underweights, however, is considerably under eastern records, but an effort will be made to bring all of the children up to normal.

The parents throughout the county are giving very good cooperation. It is reported. In the majority of cases the parents welcome the report of the health unit and comply with the suggestions. Some delay action, while a few have been antagonistically inclined, but these are few in number.

The tabulated report of the health unit showing the various defects in the several schools examined follows.

water to make a soft dough. Sift the dry ingredients together and then with two knives, cut in the shortening, add the ice water slowly and when all combined, turn out onto floured bread board and roll to 1-8 inch thickness. Prepare 5 or 6 good cooking apples by cutting into 8ths, place these in the pie plate, add 1 cup of sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg to taste and a little salt, and a few small pieces of butter. Cover with upper crust. Brush over with milk to give a glossy appearance when baked.

Preheat Hotpoint Electric Range Oven to 375—set temperature control for 375 degrees and bake for 35 minutes.

BROILED LAMB CHOPS. HAWAIIAN STYLE—Use 6 lamb chops prepared in English style (that is, rolled and boned, but not cut too thick), 6 slices of pineapple, salt, pepper butter and paprika. TO PREPARE—Oil the chops and also the broiler rack. Place on broiler rack.

Preheat Hotpoint Electric Range Oven to 400 degrees. Turn lower unit off and leave the top unit on High. Place the broiler rack on the fifth oven rack support from the top. Turn chops twice, and then raise the temperature lever to 500 degrees to brown. In a pan place the pineapple slices, spread over with melted butter, and set this pan in the oven and the fourth rack support, from the bottom of the oven, and heat slowly while the chops are broiling. Have platter in warming closet. Place pineapple on the platter and chop on top, garnish with paprika and parsley and Hotpoint toast points.

The baking contest which will close the cooking school is perhaps claiming as much time and attention as

the school itself, as the long list of valuable prizes has aroused the interest of famous cooks all over the county, as well as stirring them to the competitive spirit common among housewives the world over.

The points on which the articles will be judged is an interesting one, and should be taken into consideration when preparing the exhibits. In judging bread the following divisions will be considered: External appearance, which will include, weight, volume, color of crust, symmetry of form, evenness of bake, character of crust, bread and shred; Internal appearance will include grain, color of crumb, flavor (aroma), taste, and texture.

In the cake division the points judged will be, general appearance evenness of bake, flavor (aroma), texture, and taste. Icing will not be considered in judging cakes, except as it may help the appearance. "Frequently uniced cakes win prize owing to their fineness of texture, and color. The taste is one of the most important points," said Miss Dangier this morning.

In the pie division the exhibits will be judged on, general appearance, tenderness of crust, evenness of bake, flavor (aroma) and taste. The tenderness of crust is the paramount division.

Tomorrow Miss Dangier will have an interesting menu of cakes and icings, as well as a new dessert that will come as a welcome variety to the students of the school.
