STATE TO BUILD NEW HATCHERIES

Game Commission Authorizes Construction of Another Game Farm.

SEASON IS SEVERE

Drouth Has Lowered Water in Streams Driving Fish to Deep Pools—Game Birds Numerous.

(Associated Press Leased Wire.)

PENDLETON, June 17.—The Oregon state game commission, meeting here yesterday, authorized the construction of another state game farm and three additional hatcheries. According to Captain A. E. Burghdoff, state game warden, the game farm will probably be placed in Umatilla county, while one of the hatcheries will be put in eastern Oregon, another in Tillamook county and a third in the Willamette valley. The addition of the three hatcheries will bring the number owned by the state up to 20.

The game farm will be modeled along the same plans that were followed in laying out the game farm at Eugene. Its capacity will be between 4,000 and 4,500 mature birds each year. Between six and seven acres will be under screen and the capacity of the farm will be equally divided between Chinese pheasants and Hungarian Partridges.

The present season is proving to be one of the severest for game fish ever known in the state. Captain Burghdoff declared. The drouth has lowered the water in most streams, and fish have been forced to congregate in the deeper pools where they are easier to catch. Conditions have been very favorable for game birds, however, and it is expected that there will be more pheasants and other game birds this fall than ever before.

A decision was also made by the commission today to enter into publication of an official magazine, which will be issued the first time in September. It will contain 24 pages, and will be issued bi-monthly and will be edited by Otto M. Jones, in charge of educational work for the commission.

Members of the commission and officials here, for the meeting include L. N. Fleischer of Portland, chairman; Ben Dorris, Eugene; Harold Clifford, Prairie City; and J. W. Maloney, Pendleton, all commissioners; Mr. Jones, Frank Stelmacher, in charge of research work, and Captain Burghdoff.

The commission left for a ten day tour of eastern Oregon this morning. Tonight they plan to spend at Walla Walla lake.

Sportsmen of the country who gathered here for the banquet last night decided to effect an organization throughout the country to cooperate with the commission in matters pertaining to the welfare of the game life of the region. The site for the state game farm to be located in Umatilla county, will be selected by the eastern Oregon members of the committee, Harold Clifford of Prairie City and Judge J. W. Maloney of Pendleton and the sportsmen of the country.

LOCAL PEOPLE WILL TAKE EASTERN TRIP

R. convention this summer. L. B. Moore will leave Roseburg the latter part of July and will join his wife in Philadelphia, and they will make a tour of the east, visiting Washington, D. C., New York, Boston, and all of the larger cities. Mr. Moore has worked for the Southern Pacific company for 26 years without any extended vacation, and expects to make this trip one of the outstanding events of his life. They will return during the month of September.

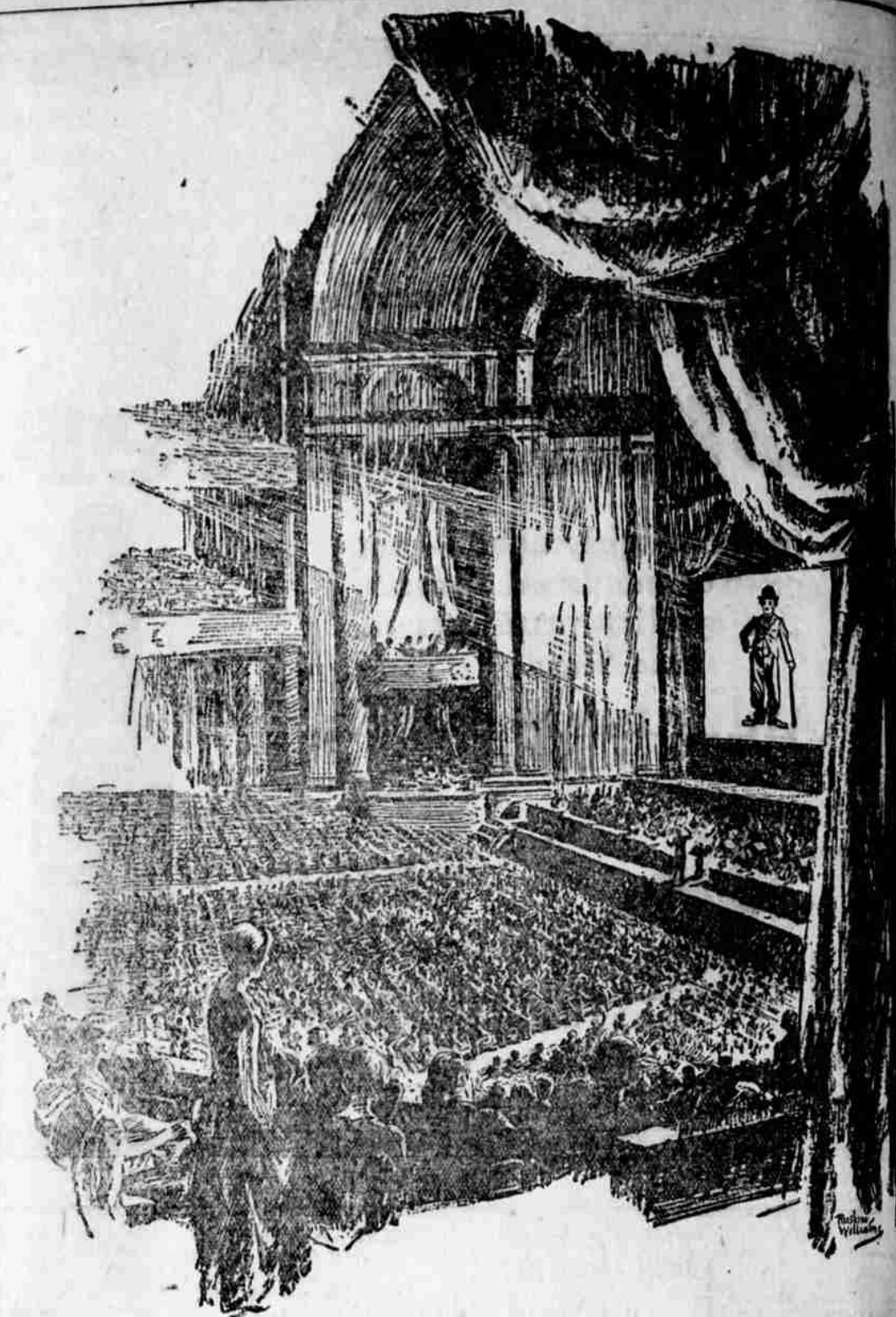
